

ATLANTIC FLEET IN HONOLULU HARBOR

FLOWER OF NAVY RETURNING TO ITS STATION BY WAY OF THE ORIENT.

Pleasant Weather and Smooth Seas Make the Voyage One of Great Pleasure.

Honolulu, July 21.—The Atlantic battleship fleet has arrived here, completing another long leg in its world cruise.

Nearly all carried American flags, and from the house-tops of the city floated, besides the Stars and Stripes, flags of almost every nation.

The formation of the fleet began to be distinguished when it was about 15 miles distant, and as it ploughed its course along the southern coast of the island it furnished a magnificent spectacle.

The fleet never had to stop or slow down nor did any of the ships have to fall out of formation through accidents to machinery or steering gear.

PROHIBITION TICKET.

Chafin and Watkins Are Selected to Carry the Banner.

Columbus, O., July 21.—For President, Eugene W. Chafin, of Chicago.

The above ticket was nominated by the Prohibitionist National Convention, both men being chosen unanimously.

On the first two ballots Mr. Chafin did not show much strength, receiving but 125 out of 1037 votes on the first and 376 out of 1087 on the second ballot.

Both the Presidential and Vice-Presidential nominees are candidates for Governor in their respective states on the Prohibition ticket.

Eugene W. Chafin, who leads the Prohibition party this year, is an attorney residing in Chicago.

The forenoon session of the convention was devoted to the discussion and adoption of a brief platform, which is possibly the shortest on record.

OFFICIALS CHARGED WITH CONTEMPT

MITCHELL AND GOMPERS CITED TO APPEAR—BOYCOTT NOT ABANDONED.

St. Louis Corporation Files Petition in District Supreme Court Accusing Them.

Washington, July 21.—In the Buck Stove & Range Company's case, Justice Sanderson, of the District Supreme Court, summoned Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor; Secretary Morrison, of that organization, and John Mitchell, of the executive council and ex-president of the United Mine-workers of America, to appear in court on September 8 to show cause why they should not be punished for contempt of the court's injunction order.

The citation is based on a petition of the Buck Stove & Range Company of St. Louis, which alleges that an order issued by Justice Gould forbidding a National boycott by the American Federation of Labor has been violated by the public utterances and addresses of the three labor leaders named.

It is also stated that Gompers caused to be published in the Federationist, the official organ of the Federation, a certain article reflecting on the court's decision, and in alleged open defiance printing the name of the Buck Stove & Range Company in the "We Don't Patronize" list.

Gompers is said to have said to several newspaper men: "So far as I am concerned, I wish to state this: When it comes to a choice between surrendering my rights as a free American citizen and violating the decision of the court, I do not hesitate to say that I shall exercise my rights as between the two."
