NEVADA SHEPHERD BRING SUIT AGAINST ROOSEVELT

Reno, Nev., Sept. 14.—For the first time in the history of this country a United States President and other Federal officials are being sued to prevent the Government from withdrawing timber lands for Government reserves. In the Federal Court at Carson City last week the case of the Eureka Livestock Company against President Roosevelt, Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, Chief Forester Pinchot and Forester Barnett is being argued, attacking the right of the defendants to withdraw forest preservation purposes a large portion of the Monitor forest in Eureka county.

The plaintiffs say they were grazing about 10,000 sheep on the reserve before it was withdrawn, and now they are refused that right.

Bryan Will Not Speak on Sunday.

Deer Park, Md., Sept. 14.—William J. Bryan today put his stamp of disapproval on Sunday political speechmaking, when, without his knowledge, the residents here were notified to assemble Sunday to hear him talk. He was finally prevailed upon to take the three-mile drive and shake hands with those in the assembly, with the understanding that he should not speak and there should be no handclapping.

OREGON OFFICIAL NARS LARGE SALMON CATCH

Portland, Or., Sept. 15.—The vigorous interstate war which is now raging along the Columbia assumed spectacular proportions this morning when Master Fish Warden Harry C. McAllister, of Oregon, opened a mart and played the role of fishmonger in the door of a boxcar at the Union depot. McAllister, in connection with his arrest of F. A. and T. J. Seufert at The Dalles last night, confiscated about two tons of salmon, which the fishermen had caught on the Washington side. These were the fish which McAllister disposed of, and the proceeds, about \$120, less freight and costs, went to the state hatchery fund.

F. A. Seufert, one of the two salmon kings of the upper river, says the act of confiscation was grand larceny, and he declares he will have the Master Fish Warden arrested on that charge. Mr. McAllister, however, took the precaution to secure legal advice on the point, so that the fishermen who have been violating the law will not be able to checkmate his future moves in this interesting chess game now being played.

Police Confess Defeat.

Oakland, Sept. 14.—The police have finally admitted that they were unable to solve the mystery of the murder of Mrs. Alice Donohue, on June 11, in Emeryville.

Last week Captain Peterson was given a letter written by Joseph Berry, the woman's former consort, to Daniel Donohue, which reached Oakland after the latter's sensational suicide. It was taken from the post-office by Deputy Public Administrator Flood. The letter is from Knob, Shasta county, and bears date of September 4, and in it Berry asks Donohue to tell everybody who the murdered woman was and to make public the fact that she was not his wife, threatening, if he did not do so, he would himself notify all the lodges and newspapers. GOOD ROADS THE SLOGAN

TWO BIG MEETINGS ARRANGED FOR

Commercial Club Takes Initiative and Invites Prominent Advocates of Better Roads to Orate Here

The regular meeting of the Commercial Club was held Monday evening with a good attendance. In the absence of President A. A. Jayne Vice President Truman Butler presided, and after the minutes of the previous meeting had been approved, Secretary P. S. Davidson announced that the most important matter to come before the meeting was in regard to the arrangements necessary for the good roads meeting, which will be held here Saturday, September 19. Mr. Davidson stated that the club had been requested by the Portland Commercial Club to set a date for the meeting and that prominent speakers would be sent here for the meeting to address it. The club was also requested to make a contribution of \$150 to the \$10,000 fund which is being raised in the state to exploit the good roads in Oregon and to defray the expense of drafting legislation and for other legitimate expenses that will be necessary to bring the good roads movement to a successful issue. The secretary stated that the amount asked for had already been guaranteed by the directors of the club and that they asked the earnest cooperation of the club members and others in making the good roads meeting a big success.

He stated that in his correspondence with Tom Richardson the latter had suggested that if the merchants could be induced to close for an hour, say from two to three o'clock, on the afternoon of the meeting, he thought that it would mean a rousing meeting and also give the movement prestige all over the state.

Judge Scott and Judge Webster, two prominent, well informed and considered the most practical good roads men in the state, will be present to address the meeting.

Chairman Butler asked what those present thought about the proposition of closing the business places for an hour Saturday afternoon, saying that he knew it presented some very awkward features, but thought if it could be accomplished it would mean the assured success of the meeting.

In response Chas. Hall said that he was enthusiastic for better roads at Hood River, in fact he thought it was the most important question before the people of the valley at the present time. He wanted to see a good big meeting but was rather doubtful if the merchants could be induced to close their stores on Saturday afternoon.

Chas. T. Early thought it would be a big thing for the meeting and also a feather in the cap of the town to let other places know that Hood River business men had taken sufficient interest in the good roads movement to suspend business for an hour. He didn't want any hardship worked on the business men or their patrons, but if they could arrange it would like to see them close.

Henry Smith, president of the merchants association, said it would be rather difficult to get the business men to agree to close on Saturday afternoon, but was willing to be one of the committee to ascertain the wishes of the business men in the matter.

R. B. Bragg, who was present, also thought it would be difficult to get the people of the stores even for an hour on Saturday afternoon.

On motion of Mr. Early a motion was carried to appoint a committee of merchants to take the matter up and the chair appointed Henry Smith, R. B. Bragg, Frank A. Cram, Geo. W. Thomson and J. H. Gill.

A motion also prevailed to hold two meetings instead of one. The afternoon meeting will be called at 2 p. m. and the evening meeting at 8.

At a meeting of the merchants association held Tuesday evening, at which the proposition to close the stores for an hour was discussed, it was decided that it would not be practicable to suspend business or an hour on Saturday.

A letter calling attention to the fact that Hood River ought to be represented with an exhibit at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, from President Newell, of the State Board of Horticulture, was read and referred to the publicity committee, who were instructed to consult with the county commissioners in regard to an appropriation to bear the expense.

H. B. Langille, secretary of the Mt. Hood Development League, who was present, said he thought the residents of the upper valley would be glad to co-operate in making an exhibit at the Seattle exposition.

Reports from the publicity committee showed that it is distributing a good deal of literature and is receiving many inquiries by letter asking for information about Hood River. Its reports also show that the advertising campaign which it has been carrying on for some time has been productive of good results and has brought a number of people here who have invested or gone into business.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR BIENNIAL FRUIT FAIR

The officers of the fruit fair association have secured the vacant lot next to the building of the Davidson Fruit company and will again hold the fair there this year. A tent 20x100 feet has been secured and a structure similar to the one used for this purpose two years ago will be erected.

Interest in the fair is growing and indications are that it will surpass all previous efforts in the way of fruit displays.

The association is in receipt of a letter from the Paoia, Colo., Fruit Fair Association asking for information in regard to exhibiting and it is possible that other districts may display some fruit in competition with that grown at Hood River and the nearby districts.

The announcement that cheap rates have been granted by the railroad company and that it will give a rate of one fare on Portland Day, Saturday, October 17, is gratifying to the fruit fair managers. Those who have been appointed on committees and intending exhibitors are asked to co-operate in making the fair better this year than ever before, if possible, as it is expected that the attendance will be the largest in the history of Hood River fruit fairs.
