Body Found at Wyeth Identified.

Through a letter received from his wife by A. C. Buck the identity of the man who was found floating in the Columbia river near Wyeth last July was established Saturday. The identification was made through effects that were found on the dead man's body and a description which was sent to his wife.

The man was Henry Graves and his home was at Colton, Cal. In a communication received by Mr. Buck it is stated that he had been at Caldwell, Idaho, before coming to Hood River and that it is believed that he committed suicide owing to despondency caused by ill health and money losses. On leaving Caldwell he wrote his wife that he was coming to Hood River, but after that she was told about finding the body here and later identified it by correspondence. The letter also stated that Graves was 70 years old.
