Through a telegram received from Indianapolis, where the national Association of Funeral Directors have just closed their session, comes the news that this association has chosen Portland for its 1909 convention, the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition being one of the factors in making this decision.

Rev. Herbert Frank Milton, of Biddeford, Maine, one of the best known lecturers in the country, is featuring his lecture on the Pacific Northwest, and the Oregon Development League, in connection with the commercial bodies of Washington, has furnished illustrating slides of extraordinary attractiveness.

It is evident that Judge John H. Scott, President of the state Good Roads Association is not letting the grass grow under his feet in pushing the Good Roads movement. Meetings have been already for at The Dalles, Dufur, Heppner and other eastern Oregon towns and the movement is meeting with enthusiasm.

The fact that Grants Pass apples won the first prizes on the principal varieties of that fruit at the district fair held at Medford recently, adds important significance to that section as an apple growing country. The action of the Medford fair managers in ignoring Grants Pass by not inviting it to exhibit, has caused considerable feeling in the prosperous Josephine county city, and rightly. If they can grow better apples at Grants Pass than they can at Medford the latter ought to honestly acknowledge it and take their defeat philosophically and graciously.

Active publicity work has resulted in such an influx of people in the more active committees of the Pacific Northwest that housing the newcomers has really become a serious problem in some of the towns. New residences are being erected as rapidly as possible, and rented long in advance of their completion. In some of the fruit districts, cars loaded with household goods are occupying the tracks and the delay in their unloading is making the orchardists apprehensive as to truckage for their fruit shipments.

Goble Mill Destroyed by Fire

The \$30,000 saw mill plant located at Goble, which was owned by H. F. Davidson and others, burned early Sunday morning entailing a loss to the company of \$15,000. Five thousand dollars of this amount is covered by insurance. The company was fortunate in saving 700,000 feet of lumber which was piled in the yard and which was but recently moved away from the mill. It is thought that the boilers and engine of the plant may not be seriously injured by the fire but until a closer examination can be made this cannot be determined. The plant had recently been put in fine working condition. Mr. Davidson went to Goble Monday to visit the scene of the fire and to confer with the insurance adjusters. Investigation has not failed to determine the cause of the fire.

GRANTS PASS APPLES

WIN AT MEDFORD

Grants Pass carried off the honors at the Medford fair but she has mighty hard time getting her goods displayed says the Rogue River Courier.

The people at Medford apparently forgot that the legislature provided for a Josephine and Jackson county fair and not only ignored Josephine county but Jackson county as well and made it a Medford affair. No invitations were sent out to exhibitors elsewhere and no premium lists were distributed.

But Grants Pass fruits take the prizes wherever they are exhibited and the judges at the Medford fair were compelled to award them the prizes in this instance. George A. Hamilton, living at Fruitdale, three miles southeast of town sent over a hastily prepared exhibit of apples the evening before the fair opened and made eleven entries. He received ten prizes, seven firsts, one second and two thirds. The list follows:

First prize, Spitzenberg. First prize Baldwin. First prize, Wixen. First prize Rhode Island Greening. First prize Arkansas Black. First Prize Lawler. First prize Red Check Pippin. Second prize Ben Davis. Third prize King. Third prize, on best apple display.

H. C. Bateham formerly of this city who is now county fruit inspector of Josephine county and who attended the fair at Medford with the intention of boosting a little for Grants Pass and the county generally was turned down. On his return Mr. Bateham said to a representative of the Courier:

"I am moved to remark that Medford and Grants Pass should have more of a co-operative spirit between them, rather than a feeling of jealousy and spite. Grants Pass should have been honored by having an invitation committee sent to them as was done to Astland and other towns. Scarcely anyone in Grants Pass knew that there was to be a fair at Medford, much less thought of making an exhibit there, whereas last year Grants Pass spent \$18,50 at Medford for advertising and got back \$11.75 in admission fees and no exhibits. This year, striving to return good for evil, our people with no solicitation or premium lists got together a small exhibit and attended the fair to the number of about 100."
