fair was that made by the Mosier Fruit Growers Association which contained 42 boxes of magnificent apples that in color, size and grading constituted a wonderful display.

Of the exhibits made by the outside towns, the largest was that of White Salmon which had 30 boxes of fine fruit on display, many of which took premiums at the White Salmon Fruit Fair.

The wonderful grapes and peaches, a big display of which occupied a long table in the center of the pavilion, from The Dalles, was a great attraction to fair visitors.

The plate exhibits were many and fine and helped very much to make the fair an attractive one aside from the commercial aspect.

One of the most interesting exhibits was that of W. W. Dakin who showed a large display of fine honey and also several colonies of bees, that could be seen housed in the honey comb for the winter.

A placard on a small exhibit grown by A. I. Mason, who has always been a star exhibitor, read:

An exhibition of apples from the orchard of B. R. Tucker, taken from 12-year-old trees that last year averaged him \$1000 an acre profit attracted much attention.

In the ladies' department the exquisite exhibits of needle, fancy and art work were admired by all who saw them and the displays of canned fruit, canned vegetables, jellies and preserves were a delight to the eye.

The windup of the big Hood River fruit fair took place Sunday and a credit to the growers, sisters and sweethearts of fruit growers and business men here who have made Hood River and its fruit fairs a success.

A plate of Cox' Orange Pippin displayed by C. G. Roberts attracted considerable attention. In England this apple is considered of a higher quality than the Newtown and brings a higher price.

The display of Campbell Bros. was noticeable for its excellent commercial pack.

Although new in the business Holbrook & Mebbins were not backward about taking prizes.

A bunch of literature placed on a convenient corner at the fair by the commercial club found many readers.

Mrs. Marion MacRae was an enthusiastic fair visitor. An apple show at Hood River without Mrs. MacRae who has sung its praises in and out of season would not be complete.

Cards distributed at the fair apprised visitors that Hood River's newest suburb is north Hood River, better known as Underwood.

Wm. Olson, County Fruit Inspector of Klickitat county came over and assisted in placing the White Salmon exhibit.

The hardest worked man during the fair was secretary C. D. Thompson. President Castner and Leslie Butler were very close second however.

Several days before the fair they made several trips in Mr. Butler's automobile to the various growers in the valley urging on them the importance of not neglecting to exhibit and the large quantity of fruit on display was largely due to their efforts.

The racks and tables and their arrangement were in the hands of the veteran exhibit carpenter Fred Larson and as usual were put up securely and with neatness and dispatch.

An interested spectator was H. J. Neely, secretary of the National Apple Show which will be held at Spokane. Mr. Neely was here to induce growers to make an exhibit for the car load prize and it is expected that Hood River will enter two cars.

Providence (Rhode Island) or some other equally distant place was good to the Hood River fair and its exhibitors. By clearing Friday morning and holding up the sprinkling can until late Sunday night it gave evidence of its omnipotence and good will toward the best on earth.

A few more fruit fairs and several Hood River growers will have to build a prize cup house.

There is nothing mean about the soil of the Upper Valley. The nearer you get to Mount Hood the larger products grow in proportion.

All the things of interest were not in the big show. Dick McDonald gave an exhibition of spraying from a tent, on the lot next his store and L. Zable showed a steam sprayer at work near the Waconoma Hotel.

Speaking of beverages, how about that cider provided by the Hood River Cider and Vinegar Company? Sparkling, amber hued, it was apparently as welcome as an oasis in the desert to thirsty travelers.

Representatives of the Pacific Homestead and Oregon Agricultural were here looking after the interests of those two excellent farm journals. Both papers will have an account of the fair.

The livestock exhibit was limited. The only specimen in evidence was an owl placed near the cider booth. Its nearness to the fount of liquid refreshment was probably accidental, nevertheless it is said that visitors can be learned from the owl.

Arthur Clarke, chairman of the committee on entertainment, assisted by A. J. Epping, demonstrated that granting concessions to side show attractions during the fair is the source of a big revenue heretofore overlooked by the fair managers.

Yokohama, Oct. 18.—Sixteen battleships, constituting the American Atlantic fleet, on its peaceful cruise around the world, are riding at anchor in the Bay of Tokio, occupying a post of honor in front of a like number of Japanese men-of-war, the white hulls of the American vessels making a strong contrast with the somber-hued ones of the Japanese.

In the bay, alive with bunting, gaily decorated tugs and steamers loaded with sightseers are steaming to and fro and launches from the shore and the war vessels are bearing uniformed officers on their official visits of welcome.

Preceded by its tender, the Yankton, the American fleet entered the harbor in a fog that hung over the bay and dropped anchor at 9.30 o'clock Sunday morning, one-half hour later than the time scheduled. This was due to the fog.

The fleet proceeded to its anchorage ground and anchored in four columns in front of the Japanese fleet. When anchors were cast, a reception committee representing every department of the Japanese government and accompanied by attaches of the various foreign embassies and legations and the Mayor of Yokohama boarded the flagship Connecticut and officially welcomed Rear-Admiral Sperry, his officers and men to Japan.
