

EVENTS IN OREGON

Allege Crooked Dealings. Portland.—A petition praying that the Albany Farmers' Company, of Linn county, be declared bankrupt, was filed last week before the United States court.

William Long, a grain buyer, also makes a serious charge in the petition. He claims to have lost 873 bushels of oats. Mr. Long says he sold his warehouse receipt to J. R. Baltimore and that when this receipt, signed by the Farmers' Company, was presented to the bank on which it was drawn, payment was refused.

Three Months for Stealing an Apple. La Grande.—Peculiar freaks in justice were exemplified in one instance here in which an illiterate Austrian was the victim. Through the apparent oversight on the part of a justice of the peace in Elgin, this Austrian was held in the county jail for nearly three months on a charge of stealing an apple. The indictment which caused his arrest in Elgin three months ago specified that he stole the one apple, and the justice of the peace bound him over to await the action of the circuit court grand jury.

Portland Wireless to Hawaii. Portland.—The Council Crest station of the United Wireless Telegraph Company was in communication Saturday night with Kahuka Point, Oahu, just west of Honolulu. It is claimed this establishes a new record for long-distance telegraphing by wireless. The station at that point has recently been established, and the messages received at Council Crest were the first from Oahu to the Coast.

The air line distance between Kahuka Point and Portland is about 2300 miles, it being about 2100 miles from San Francisco to the island. It is expected that in a short time a permanent service will be established between the Coast and the Hawaiian Islands.

Arrested Man Soon Revenged. The Dalles.—Arrested for jumping his board bill, Lewis Kracht had the complaining witness in the case, Peter Henningsen, arrested for selling intoxicating liquors on Sunday. Mr. Henningsen, who is proprietor of the Gerlinger Hotel here, had a warrant sworn out for the arrest of Kracht on the charge of jumping his board bill. Kracht pleaded guilty, paid the amount of the bill, \$4.50 and costs in the case. Next day he visited the district attorney, and of his own volition told him that on Sunday, September 20, Henningsen sold him liquors, besides selling to six other men, the names of whom he gave to the official. The six witnesses all substantiated Kracht's testimony.

OREGON BRIEFLETS

Snow fell last week in the Bear Creek neighborhood, the first of the season in Crook county.

A company of soldiers from Fort Walla Walla are on the Umatilla reserve, where they will enforce the law in regard to the Indians dipping their horses when affected with scab.

The total wool output of Oregon this year is estimated at 18,500,000 pounds, as compared with 20,000,000 pounds shown in 1907. The value of this year's clip is approximately \$2,500,000.

Andrew Todd, a Hubbard farmer, fell beneath a load of straw Saturday in such a manner that the wheels of the vehicle passed over his body breaking his neck. He was formerly a civil engineer and came to this country from England.

Attorneys from Portland and other sections are in La Grande to fight the legal battles for the O. R. & N. In the damage suits that are pending and total more than \$100,000. One man lost a foot and asks for \$50,000. Another man asks for \$25,000.

Albany will soon have one of the largest seminaries in the state. The big addition to the building of the Academy of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, a Catholic seminary for young women, is nearing completion and the school will then be one of the finest of the kind in the state.

Notwithstanding the heavy drain upon the treasury by reason of the adoption of the university appropriations last June, for which no state levy was made last January, the funds in the state treasury will be sufficient to pay all warrants between now and the time when 1909 taxes will begin to come in next April.

Would Corner Liquor Sales. Medford.—At a special meeting of the city council last week an ordinance was introduced at the request of W. L. Vaughn, of Portland, for the sale to the Medford Gothenberg Association of the exclusive right to sell liquor within the corporate limits of Medford for a period of ten years, beginning on October 1, 1909, for \$55,000, to be paid at the rate of \$5000 for the first five years and \$6000 the second five.

At the present time there are nine saloons here, but under the rules of the association there will be but six, and the rules of the association provide for strict regulations.

Mr. Vaughn states that the plan as provided by the Gothenberg Association has worked admirably wherever tried.

Gatch Is Made Receiver of Bank. La Grande.—Claud Gatch, National Bank Examiner, has been appointed receiver of the suspended Farmers & Traders National Bank of this city.

For a time it was believed that a local man would be named receiver. Several reorganization schemes are afoot which, if carried to a successful consummation, will mean full reimbursement for the depositors.

J. W. Scriber, cashier of the defunct bank, has been bound over to await the action of the Federal grand jury. His bonds were placed at \$15,000, which were readily supplied.

The exact amount of Scriber's defalcations is not known, but a statement given out yesterday places the sum at at least \$12,000. Further examination of the bank's books are expected to enlarge these figures.

The Washington county commissioners have leased the poor farm, situated on the Southern Pacific railway, a mile east of Hillsboro, to Martin Vandehy, who will pay the county \$150 per year rental for the farm and care for the inmates, providing board and clothing for \$10 per month each. As a rule, there are about an average of 10 inmates at the place. The county bought the present poor farm about 20 years ago and could now realize several times the purchase price.

Sunday marked the 55th anniversary of the United Presbyterian Church of Albany, the oldest church of that denomination in the world.

Organization of the church was effected October 11, 1853, in a house which yet stands in that city. The United Presbyterian denomination was first formed in Oregon. It resulted from a union of the Associate church and the Associate Reform church at a meeting held October 20, 1852, at the home of Rev. Wilson Blain, at Union Point, 3 miles south of the present town of Brownsville. Rev. Blain, who conducted an Associate Reform church at Union Point, and Rev. Thomas A. Kendall, who was pastor of an Associate church at a point on the Calapooia river, near the present town of Shedd, formed the union and adopted the name "United Presbyterian." This was six years before the United Presbyterian church was formed in Pennsylvania, which was the beginning of that denomination in the East.

LABOR IN DEMOCRATIC STATES.

Coal Miners in Alabama Subjugated Into Creating Dependence.

That there is a "rift within the lute" of the Gompers proposition to deliver the labor vote of the country to Democracy is becoming more apparent. While Mr. Bryan and Mr. Gompers are making special appeals to labor, neither refers to the deplorable condition of labor in the Democratic South. Mr. John P. White, for six years president of the Iowa United Mine Workers, and now one of the national officers of the United Mine Workers' Association, who investigated mining labor conditions in the South, is not so reticent. In a recent address to Local Union No. 97 of Albia, Iowa, he told of persecutions of labor in Alabama where a coal miners' strike was in progress. He is reported as saying: "The miners of Alabama have been subjugated until a majority have become cringing dependents. Almost daily some of the laboring men of that state were mercilessly shot down for daring to assert their rights as American citizens. Ninety-one members of the Mine Workers' Association were thrown into jail without having committed any crime other than becoming members of the organization." Alabama is a State absolutely under control of the Democracy.
