EVENTS IN OREGON

Hypnotism Excuse for Bigamy.
 Portland—Ward Robertson, employed on the famous "horse radish patch," near Beaverton, was arrested Saturday afternoon by Constable Wagner on a charge of polygamy. He is held at the county jail in the sum of \$2500.
 Mrs. Julia Gundlark, or rather Mrs. Robertson, No. 5, is the complainant, and it is said that Mrs. Robertson No. 4, who resides at Beaverton, will appear as a willing witness against her husband. Wife No. 5 lives in this city, and there are many strange features in connection with the case.
 Robertson has been married five times, including the ceremony by which he was married to Mrs. Gundlark. Mrs. Gundlark, wife No. 5, has also been married five times, including her marriage to Robertson. He is 55 years of age, the father of five children, four of whom are dead. Robertson admits that he married the woman, having never obtained a divorce from his wife. The woman declares she did not know he was married when she consented to become his wife.
 Another strange feature is that each claims to have been hypnotized by the other. The man would never have married the woman, he says, but for the hypnotic influence of her eyes; the woman would never have married the man, she says, but for the hypnotic influence of his voice.

Richard Scott Dies at Milwaukee.
 Milwaukee—Richard Scott, of Milwaukie, one of the best known men of Oregon, died suddenly at 12:45 Monday morning at his home. His death was most unexpected, heart failure being the cause. Mr. Scott had been in his usual health Sunday and his sudden death was a great shock to his family.

Mr. Scott was apparently in his usual health Sunday. He attended church at Sellwood in the morning and appeared to be well at night. He ate his usual meals Sunday and did not complain of illness. His death occurred after he had retired for the night, having passed away without the least warning. The end came painlessly and after being stricken he died at once.

Mr. Scott was very prominent in the Oddfellows, which was the only lodge he ever joined. He was past grand master, as well as being trustee of the Oddfellows' home, a position he held at the time of his death.

Daughter Identifies Father.
 Oregon City—The identity of the man who was found September 13 near Oswego, has been ascertained to be F. A. Williamson, of Lents, Or. Mrs. Effie B. Robertson, his daughter, with whom he lived, gave an accurate description of her father, on whose body was found \$660 in \$20 gold pieces. Last week she visited the spot where her father's body was discovered, and in among the leaves was found his watch, in the back of which was his picture, with these words: "This is my daughter's picture. Her name is Effie B. Robertson. She lives at Firland Station, Oregon. I am F. A. Williamson, her father. This wide world is my home."

Williamson was subject to heart trouble and suffered a fatal attack while out in the woods. He had been dead at least six weeks when his body was found.

Auto Driver Wins From Farmer.
 Salem—A most unusual automobile case was tried in the circuit court here last week, when an automobile driver sought damages from a farmer whose team plunged into his automobile. C. W. Cutsforth, of Gervais, was the plaintiff, and he wanted \$940 damages for injury to himself and auto. M. Benjamin, also of Gervais, was defendant.

As Benjamin drove his prancing horse alongside the auto, he lost his bearings in the darkness and excitement and tried to drive his horse across the road close behind the automobile lights. When the horses stopped with their heads towards the auto, Benjamin lashed them with his whip and they sprang into the machine.

That the jury thought the tomatist at fault is shown by their verdict of \$400 damages awarded the plaintiff.

Scores of Horses Dying.
 Pendleton—Nearly 160 head of horses have died and more are affected with a mysterious disease, in a small section of country about ten miles west of Walla Walla, according to an authentic report reaching this city. Several different veterinarians have been called in and a number of post mortem examinations have been held, but so far the doctors have been unable to determine exactly the cause of death.

The most commonly accepted theory is that the animals have been poisoned by stibbled seed, as it is well known that moulds and different kinds of fungus grow frequently form in stibbled seed. In many cases this mould or fungus is poisonous and it is thought that this must be the cause of the present epidemic among the horses just across the line in Washington.

OREGON BRIEFLETS

The State Land Board has just approved 33 applications for the loan of the common school fund interest, aggregating \$46,275.

Mrs. Nancy Young, of Central Point, fell from the vestibule of a Southern Pacific train, near Grants Pass, last week and narrowly escaped death.

The corner stone of the new High School building at North Bend was laid Monday. It will cost \$53,000 and will be the finest building in that part of the state.

Clerks in Pendleton clothing stores have succeeded in having their employers sign an agreement to open their places of business at 7:30 in the morning, instead of 7 o'clock, as formerly.

The jury in the case of the State vs. J. Kitching and George McVey, indicted jointly for shooting up the Pineville Methodist church last September, returned a verdict of not guilty last week.

Frank O'Day, an oil man, will drill for oil at Coos Bay. It has been known for some time past that there was oil around there, and during the past summer a number of investigations along that line have been made.

R. I. Hume's gasoline schooner Osprey was taken off the bar of Rogue river at high tide last week. No damage was done to her. The Enterprise is high on shore, upright and uninjured. Efforts are being made to raise her and take her overland along the beach. No one was injured and all freight has been unloaded.

The latest thing in the way of water appropriations from the Umatilla river was the filing with the County Recorder of the appropriation of 30,000 inches from the river, five or six miles below Pendleton. The papers state that the water is for the development of electrical power and other purposes.

Hog cholera has made its appearance in the vicinity of Junction City for the first time. In the large herd of C. W. Washburne, who has lost 35 head of large porkers, and it is feared will lose 100 more. The State Veterinary Surgeon was there a few days ago and pronounced it the same hog cholera that exists in some of the Eastern states.

The Central Oregon railroad is rapidly carrying forward its survey work. This proposed line will cross Crooked River gorge, 20 miles west of Prineville, from Madras to Bend, and a spur is to be built from that point to Prineville, which will thus largely eliminate Shantko as the principal wool and cattle shipping point in interior Oregon.

D. H. Weyant, of Salem, is arranging to secure from Lane county materials for an Oregon forestry exhibit at the Seattle exposition next year. He got up the mineral exhibit for the Lewis and Clark exposition in 1905, and the state commission for the Seattle exposition employed him to get up the state's forestry exhibit at that fair.

Harry Clark, a young Indian, who was on parole, is in the Oregon City jail, charged with robbing Mrs. Victoria Howard, a Grand Ronde Indian, who says Clark took from her a certificate of deposit on a Sheridan bank for \$190 and \$13 in cash. Saturday night she was given some coffee by the Indian entertainer and says there were some knock-out drops in it.

Frank Busch, of Oregon City, lost 500 fine Eastern trout a few days ago in a peculiar manner. He had the fish in a pond on a lot adjoining his store, and last week the rain overflowed the pond and the fish made their way through the streams to the Willamette river. The trout had been fed and cared for by Mr. Busch for several years and were 12 to 16 inches long. Not a single one remains in the pond.

As a result of eating poisoned meat, four persons, Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Hutson, their daughter, Mrs. Dunnivan, and her 9-months-old baby have been lying in a critical condition at their home in Glendale. Some meat which had been cooked the day before and left in the warming-oven under a tin cover was eaten and in a short time all were taken violently ill.

The biggest individual bounty warrant yet issued in Douglas county was received last week by "Bill" Bradley, the lone resident of Caps Illah, near the head waters of the North Umpqua river, 70 miles east of Roseburg. Bradley presented the scalp of 37 wolves and coyotes, which, at \$10 apiece, brought him a total bounty of \$370. All the animals were slain by Bradley between August 15 and October 10 of this year. Some he poisoned, others he trapped, while the remainder he shot after they had been bayed by his hound.

Mayor S. S. Johnson and Postmaster A. W. Severance, of Tillamook, engaged in a fist-to-face battle in the postoffice building last week. The trouble arose over a local option case tried in the justice court, in which Severance was the complaining witness and Johnson the defendant's attorney. The lie passed between the two men while Johnson was standing at the money-order window, Johnson striking the postmaster in the face through the window. Severance hurried from behind the railing and in a few minutes the two were mixing things at a lively rate, the Mayor receiving the worst of the deal. They were finally separated by bystanders.

Albany Invites Portland
 Thirty-three of Albany's leading business men came to Portland Friday to personally invite the business men of this city to participate in a celebration at Albany on Tuesday, November 10th, with the Line county apple show and the opening of a fine new depot as the features. As an evidence of the enterprise of this Albany delegation, each and every one of them bought his own round trip ticket and left Albany at four o'clock in the morning, starting to work in Portland at 7:55. They were guests at a special luncheon at the Portland Commercial Club. Portland excursionists will go by special train and the party will be one of the largest that has gone from the city this fall.

Coyote and Jackrabbit Roundup
 A dispatch to the Spokesman Review says:
 That the proposed coyote and jackrabbit hunt, which is to take place on November 9, is destined to be the biggest event of its kind ever pulled off in the northwest is evidenced by the preparations already being made for about 1000 participants from different parts of the state. Originally intended to be simply a local affair, the popularity of the sport has caused hundreds of inquiries to be made regarding the event from all over the northwest.

At a meeting yesterday the following were appointed to serve as a committee: R. T. Woodruff, W. O. Tetlow, P. F. Schellie of Wenatchee; A. P. Kiser, M. Clark, L. N. Simmons of South Bend; J. M. Thomas of Lewiston; W. M. Dunn, Waterville; Frank Palmer, Cashmere; R. A. Brown, Monitor; Percy Walker, Willson Creek; Kelley Davis, Douglas; John Owens, Ephrata; Frank Lillington, Quincy; Thomas Chisholm, Malaga; R. Keen, Rock Island. Twenty lieutenants were also appointed to take charge of the roundup and will lead the participants in the final slaughter.

It has been decided that rifles should be barred and no firearms should be used except shotguns, and no other ammunition than double 0. No member will be allowed to participate in the final slaughter except those who are on the line of drive at 8 a. m. on the morning of November 9.

The drive will take in the country from Rock Island around Beaver creek, and will cover the country known as Hell's Half Acre, the final slaughter taking place near the junction of the Wenatchee and Columbia rivers on the Douglas county side, across from Wenatchee.
