### BOOSTER MEETING AT WHITE SALMON

The greatest meeting that White Salmon has ever known took place Saturday when people from all parts of this section gathered at the opera house to further the interests of White Salmon valley. The White Salmon band played a conspicuous part at the meeting.

Mayor J. C. McInnes introduced Rev. Tate, who, after making some humorous remarks, urged the people to move forward with a united front, reminding them that only by union comes success.

F. M. Fraser, president of the Klickitat Development league, made a few very timely remarks on the union of the entire county and pledged its cooperation in any movement for the advancement of this section.

D. W. Dexter formerly of New York, who has lately located in this valley, gave the impressions of an easterner when coming into this country. After reviewing the scenes along the Rhine and the peaks of the Alps, he said that the scenery here surpassed them all; that the valley affords the finest climate and more advantages than any other section he has ever visited.

Dorsey B. Smith of the O. R. I. company praised the work that is now being done and pledged himself and the services of the company which he represents to the support of any movement to help develop this section.

H. M. Adams, general freight and passenger agent of the north bank railroad, placed before the people the great possibilities of this valley, as everything here contributes to the best interests of a fruit growing section. He declared that the transportation facilities are now better than ever and every inducement possible will be offered the people of this valley. He said that the low rates will continue from the east, and this country should get its share of the newcomers. He advocated a fruit growers' union and urged that the label, "White Salmon," be placed on every box of fruit grown in this valley.

C. C. Chapman, an advertising expert from Portland, discussed the best ways of advertising. He was followed by Tom Richardson of the Portland Commercial club, who praised the scenery and prospects of this valley. He predicted that the land would bring \$1,000 per acre in a very few years. Twenty-one hundred dollars was raised by subscriptions—Portland Journal.

**Thanksgiving Proclamation.** The annual Thanksgiving proclamation has been issued by the president who has set aside Thursday, Nov. 26th as the day to give thanksgiving.

"Year by year," declares the proclamation, "this nation grows in strength and worldly power. During the century and a quarter that has elapsed since our entry into the circle of independent people we have grown and prospered in material things to a degree never before known, and not known in any other country. The 13 colonies which struggled along the seacoast of the Atlantic and were hampered in but a few miles west of tide-water by the Indian hunted wilderness, have been transformed into the mightiest republic which the world has ever seen. Its domains stretch across the continent from one to the other of the greatest oceans, and it exercises dominion alike in the Arctic and tropic realms. The growth in wealth and population has surpassed even the growth in territory. No where else in the world is the average of individual comfort and material well-being as high as in our fortunate land.

"For the very reasons thus abounded we owe to the Almighty to show equal progress in moral and spiritual things. With a nation, as with the individual who make up a nation, material well-being is an indispensable foundation. But the foundation avails nothing of itself. That it is wasted and worse than wasted which is spent in giving, helping, those things which minister to the pleasure of the body; and to the power that rests only on wealth. Upon material well-being as a foundation must be raised the structure of the lofty life of the spirit, if this nation is properly to fulfill its great mission and ac-

complish all we so ardently hope and desire. The things of the body are good, the things of the intellect better, but best of all things of the soul, for in the nation, as in the individual in the long run it is character that counts. Let us, therefore as a people, set our faces resolutely against evil and with broad charity with friendliness and good will toward all men, but with unflinching determination to smite down wrong strive with all the strength that is given us for righteousness in public and in private life."

**200 Cars a Week From Wenatchee.** Apple shipments are being made out of Wenatchee at the rate of 200 carloads a week, says the Spokesman Review, and the fruitgrowers are much pleased with the outlook in the apple market, which has picked up considerably in the last few weeks. Many are going to hold back part of their crop till spring, when they expect to receive big prices.

The weather during the month of October was just right to put the color on the apples and the crop this year makes one of the best showings ever put out from this section. Winter bananas are demanding about \$2.50 per box, and those who are for sale are anxious to have them as res-ping a barometer.

**California to Fight Race Tracks.** With the election over and the session of the legislature of the state but little more than a month away, the interests for and against the race track gambling in California are aligning their forces for what probably will be one of the most interesting battles ever fought at the state capital. The California anti-race track league has been working for several years for the issues that will come before the state legislature and expects to make the hardest fight of its record this winter. On the other hand the death of race track gambling in many eastern states has left California one of the few places where betting on horse races is still permitted and race track men from all parts of the Union are joining hands to put up the fight of their lives.

It is admitted that the death of race track betting in California would be the heaviest blow yet sustained, next to that in New York, and a tremendous fight against the proposed anti-race track law will be led by the California Jockey Club, probably under the direction of President Tom Williams.

**Replace Tel-graph by 'Phone.** Telephones will a most entirely displace the telegraph as a means of dispatching trains over the Great Northern system if plans now under serious consideration by James J. Hill, chairman of the board of directors, and his son, Louis W. Hill, president of the road, are carried out. L. W. Hill stated that such a plan was under contemplation and would be probably carried into effect.

Trains of two eastern divisions on the Great Northern are now dispatched by telephone, and on a third east-ern division the system is being installed. The telephone system has proved successful wherever tried.

Practically all block systems on the Great Northern are now equipped with a composite telegraph and telephone service, thus allowing train-men who are not telegraph operators to report the arrival of their trains in the blocks. With very little difficulty, the Great Northern can transform the individual telephone block into a dispatching system.

The necessity of a telephone dispatching system is being brought about the demand on the part of the public for more rapid and frequent train service, and the near approach of the federal eight-hour rule for telegraph-ers, coupled with the secrecy of operator.

**Found a Bear Tree.** Gaspar Mathews, of Hosum, Wash., made a peculiar discovery a few days ago near his ranch here. He was out cutting timber on the place and after falling a dead tree, was surprised to see skeletons of five bears fall out on the ground from the hollow of the trunk of the tree. It was surely a "bear tree" and the whole of a bear family must have creased into the hollow of the tree and perished from starvation or some other cause.—Chronicle.

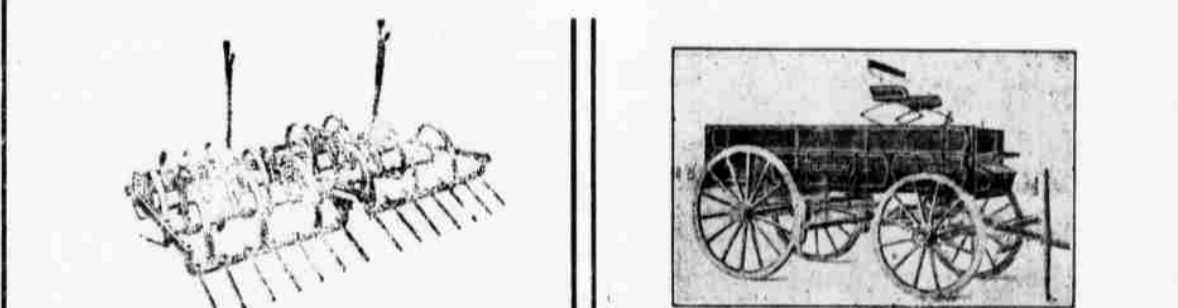
