ANOTHER VIEW OF THE NEW YORK APPLE SHOW

If the members of the Hood River Apple Growers' Union could have been present at the apple show here this week, their hearts would certainly have been filled with pride, if they saw the throngs of this great metropolis admiring and purchasing their fruit. In arranging for the display in the main show room of the Fruit Auction Building, Steinhardt & Kelly, the New York distributors, selected a room that was centrally located and convenient for the trade and the public as well. There would have been abundance of room for the display and also for the visitors had not the number of the latter far exceeded the expectations. As it was there was plenty of room for the display, and while at times the crowds jostled each other, New Yorkers are used to this sort of thing, and always take it good naturedly.

The apples were arranged artistically, and so that they could be shown to the best advantage, the room being decorated with American flags and palms. The beauty of the fruit itself was such, however, that the decorations were hardly noticed. There has never before been anything like this show in the trade, or rather which would in any way compare with it, and from the expressions heard on every side, it was quite evident that the greater portion of the visitors had never before known that Hood River could grow so many different varieties of the apple. One old gray-haired veteran remarked while viewing the exhibit that he had seen apples in all parts of the world, but that he had never seen anything to compare with these.

As there is such keen competition in the apple trade, it was somewhat surprising how completely jealousies were laid aside and how members of competitive firms joined in praising the exhibit. Not only were the members of the wholesale apple trade out in full force, but the retailers and the public in general attended in large numbers. When leaving, each visitor had some favorable comment to make, and when meeting others, he advised them to visit the exhibition, such an impression did it make upon his mind. The show was in fact the chief topic of interest in the trade this week, and the Hood River Apple Growers' Union should certainly feel elated and gratified at its complete success. All of the largest city papers contained elaborate descriptions of the display, and it is safe to say that Hood River apples were never more thoroughly advertised than they were this week.

Owing to the great number of varieties displayed and to the further fact that a great portion of the Journal's readers are more or less familiar with the appearance of each, a description of each variety would be superfluous, but each variety was perfect of its kind and received its portion of the praise. The big Wall River, 27 at which all an ordinary apple box, naturally attracted comment, and the Spitzenbergs and Newtowns, whose popularity is already world-wide, also brought smiles to the faces of the inspecting visitors. The complete list of apples displayed is as follows:

Following the display, the entire lot was bought by Henry R. Halliwell & S. A. of Philadelphia, which firm will place the fruit on exhibition in that city from Tuesday until Saturday at next week. This enterprise is giving firm saw the vast amount of advertising that the exhibitors here were receiving and also how the exhibit was appreciated by the public and seized this opportunity to provide a treat for their own city.

Steinhardt & Kelly certainly spared no pains to make the affair the success that it was, and it was due to their efforts, as well as the high character of the exhibit, that it was so well attended, and if the Hood River Apple Growers' Union fully appreciate
