

MAINE WANTS PACK LIKE HOOD RIVER'S

Portland, Me., Nov. 25, 1908.
Steinhardt & Kelly,
Gentlemen:-

At the mid-winter meeting of the Maine State Board of Trade, it is my intention to make an address to the assembled board and members, of the need of improvement in the raising and marketing of the State of Maine apples. As an object lesson as to what can be done by careful scientific methods in raising apples, I wish to use a Hood River apple as an example, and I see from the fruit pack that you are distributors of the Hood River Apple Union. I take the liberty to address you for the address of some official of the Hood River people from whom I can get information as to the general points that I want to be informed on regarding the methods employed by the raiser in raising and caring for his crop not with the idea that the same conditions as prevail in the Hood River valley would, in all ways, be applicable in the State of Maine, but as an object lesson to our farmers that if they expect to compete with the fruit raised in the west, they must get over the idea that after they set the tree out, all they have to do is to leave the rest of the work to nature, and it is my intention at the meeting, which is held in March, to have present with me a box of the finest quality Hood River apples which can be procured at that season, as an object lesson to those present, of the quality of apples we have got to have in order to compete with those raised in the west. The fact that last year when State of Maine apples were going begging in Boston at \$1.50 to \$1.60 per barrel by the wagon load, your apples were selling from \$3.50 to \$4.00 per box, and at the present time, when State of Maine apples are retailing in grocery stores from 25c to 40c per peck, your apples are retailing from 3c to 6c each over the fruit man's counter. I think you will see from this what I want to get in the shape of information, and any pointers that you can give me on the subject to help me in preparing my address would be greatly appreciated, and when the time comes for the meeting, I want to procure, either through you or through your agent in Boston, as handsome a box of apples as is possible to procure, to take down and open in the meeting, which consists of from two hundred to three hundred of the prominent men in the State, as an example of what can be done by careful and scientific methods.

Any information you can give me will be greatly appreciated.

Farmers Invited to Conference

Farmers all over the Inland Empire and the Northwest have been invited by the Spokane chamber of commerce to attend the sessions of the Commission on Country Life in Spokane, Saturday, December 5, when Prof. L. H. Bailey, chairman, and his associates, appointed by President Roosevelt to inquire into existing conditions of farm life in the United States. The question to be discussed are: "How to make the Farmer Happier," and "What is needed to make farm life more profitable."

Secretary Monroe of the chamber of

commerce, says among other things in his invitation to the farmers: "The Commission will arrive Friday, December 4 and will remain until Saturday night at 11 o'clock. There will be three sessions at 10 o'clock a. m., 2 and 8 o'clock p. m. The commissioners hope to meet as many people whose interests are related to country life as possible. The plan is to hold meetings accessible to all the representative people of a region, such as the Spokane country, and hear their discussion and opinions on country conditions, and their suggestions for improvement, if any is needed."

At a recent meeting of the White Mountain (N. H.) Board of Trade the question of good roads was discussed from several standpoints. Among other speakers was C. E. Farnsworth, advertising manager of the Boston and Maine Railroad, who took his specialty as the subject of his remarks for a community or a section.

Some of his suggestions are worthy of earnest consideration by the dwellers of country districts.

"I think you will all agree," said the speaker, "that the public do not go to the Adirondacks or the White Mountains because of the mere fact that the railroads operate to those points." Hotels, it was declared, are necessary to induce guests, while it is equally true guests are essential to the support of the hotels.

"It has now become a necessity to steadily create the desire among the public to travel, to see, to visit, to obtain recreation, rest and entertainment, which are all within the vacation idea, which is no longer a fad, but is firmly established as one of the necessities among all classes," Mr. Farnsworth asserted. "The patrons and guests of hotels must not be confused, however, to piazzas and door yards when seeking recreation in the country."
