NATIONAL APPLE SHOW AWARDS OREGON RECEIVES SPECIAL PRIZE

Washington Receives Bulk of Prizes, Yakima Getting Prize for Carload Lot—Other Awards.

The National Apple Show came to a successful close Saturday. During the week 102,000 admissions were recorded and visitors were present from many parts of the United States and some from abroad. Prominent public men, horticulturists and apple growers spoke on the many phases of fruit growing and marketing during the show and the affair resulted in giving Spokane and the State of Washington an immense amount of advertising.

With the exception of an exhibit displayed by Grants Pass and one by L. E. Clark of Hood River and the display sent there from the exhibit of the Oregon State Horticultural Society by the Portland Commercial Club, Oregon was not represented. The only competitive display from Hood River was that of Mr. Clark who took first prize on Baldwin.

The Oregon display sent by the Portland Commercial Club which was composed of Hood River apples was given a special prize cup and is said by impartial judges who were at the show to have been the finest exhibit there.

Among those who attended from Hood River were E. H. Shearer, P. S. Davidson, Leslie Butler, John Caster, C. Dethman and Chris Greisen who was there in the interests of "Better Fruit."

The Hood River display which is largely owned by Portland men who were the donors of cups at the Oregon state Horticultural show was packed up after the show at Spokane and sent back to Portland. The only other prize of local interest taken was one which went to White Salmon.

In its account of the awards the Spokesman Review says: The first prize for the best carload of apples, the chief contest of all at the National Apple show, was awarded Friday to M. H. Jones of Wenatchee, and consists of \$1000 in cash. Mr. H. Jones' apples constituted a mixed display, with two or three rows of apples of red variety alternating with greens and yellows.

The second prize went to H. M. Gilbert of North Yakima, Wash., who had a carload of Winesaps of uniform color and size running 112 to the box. The prize is \$500 in cash. Montana won the third prize in this class, a carload of McIntosh apples exhibited by Kress & Carley of Hamilton, Ravalli county, the prize being \$200 in cash, and 1000 standard apple boxes.

This was perhaps the most important contest, but the public and the contesting growers showed more interest in the contest in the two-box, two-bushel, two-jar, two-barrel contest, where much adornment and careful arrangement had been expended. These awards were not decided last night, but will be given out this morning and the displays will be decorated with the winning boughs.

Out of a total of 30 awards thus far made 58 went to Washington, 11 to California, five to Idaho and one to Montana. Oregon is not in any of the contests, though it has over 100 boxes of apples on exhibition from Hood River. Wenatchee won more prizes than any other two sections, taking 25 out of Washington's 58.

In addition to the following awards there are many specials given by various business firms of Spokane and by individual growers, which will be added to those of the first prize winners, such as barrels of McIntosh apples, etc., for special meritorious details in winners.

Outplayed throughout the game the Mount Hood basketball team met with a defeat of 30 to 7, last Friday night at the rink, when they tried to compete with the High School boys of this city. The occasion did not draw a very large crowd, but the few that were there gave some high school yells that cheered the players greatly.

At first the visitors put up a fairly good fight but as soon as our own speedy little players got warmed up there was simply nothing to it. Sometimes the blue and white would play catch with the ball nearly a minute before the upper valley boys would break up Hood River's clever team work. Although the ball often came within a foot of dropping in the basket for the visitors, during the first half the clubmen were unfortunate in not making a basket from the field and they only made two from the foul line.

It was just luck that the score wasn't run up higher than it was because the ball was thrown at us as it was put in.

The second half was similar to the first with the exception of the upper valley boys making two baskets from the field and one from the foul line.

Johnson, who played right forward made one basket during the first half and three during the second, but distinguished himself in other ways by breaking up plays, etc.

Hartley made all the baskets from the foul line and five from the field. Young played exceptionally well for a center and made five baskets, most of which were made by picking the ball up out of scrummages and throwing it in the dog catcher's mitt. Kent and Bell took care of their opponents when they tried to throw baskets in the blue shape.

WILL DEVELOP TUCKER POWER

PURCHASED BY A NEW COMPANY

Full Power of Present Plant is to be Developed at Once and Plans Made to Utilize the Balance.

The purchase by Dr. J. F. Watt and his father, Abial S. Watt, of Portland, of the Tucker power site and two miles of water rights adjoining and above it on the Hood river has caused widespread interest in this city.

It is learned from Dr. Watt that the purchase was made for the purpose of developing the big power resources at this point in the river and that a company has been formed and papers of incorporation filed. The name of the new company is the Watt Development company and in it, in addition to Dr. Watt and his father there are several Portland men who he is not at present prepared to name.

It is stated that the amount of power which can be utilized from the present plant is about 1,000 horsepower which will be improved almost immediately and as soon as conditions warrant it will be brought to this city to be utilized in any way there is a demand for it.

The total amount of power which can be developed is thought to be between 8,000 and 10,000 horsepower and the company has had a preliminary survey made which outlines a plan to harness the near approach of an electric railroad in view of the several franchises that the city council has been asked to grant recently and which they have under consideration. It is claimed that the Tucker site is admirably situated for the installation of electric power for this purpose and that the promoters of the electric road in the Upper Valley had considered a proposition to obtain it when they started the agitation for an electric line.

Located on one of the main roads of the valley with ample space and a rock bottom for a foundation it is said that the site is well adapted to the erection of a power house or any other buildings that might be necessary to insure the full use of the power or its development.

Philadelphia, December 5, 1908. Messrs. Steinhardt & Kelley, 11 Park Place, New York.

Gentlemen: "The apple exhibit is over." We wish to thank you very much for the broad spirit by which you made this transaction with us.

First of all you realize no doubt, that you were trading (and passing this display of apples over to one who would obtain satisfactory results. And who would not submit to any of those small irritating ways that have heretofore existed in the men who had control from this district.

Under no circumstances would we have made it possible to have made these apples as popular in Philadelphia as they are to-day if we had to the Philadelphia firm, has been turned over to us by the Union for publication thinking it would prove interesting to Hood River growers.
