

WATER FIGHT IN WASCO COUNTY

A big battle is promised in the courts of The Dalles in the near future, says the Journal, when it will be decided who is entitled to appropriate the waters of Clear Lake, in the southern part of Wasco county. Several corporations have filed notices of appropriation of the waters of this lake and also a portion of Boulder creek, Cedar creek and White river, in the immediate vicinity of the lake. The waters of these streams and of Cedar lake will be used to irrigate the Juniper Flat and Wapinitia country, comprising an arid district embracing thousands of acres of the best land in Wasco county. J. H. Kelly of Portland is the latest appropriator and he has filed notices of appropriation for the waters of Boulder creek, Cedar creek and White river, as well as the waters of Clear Lake.

Kelly, with J. R. Kepp, also of Portland, has spent thousands of dollars in buying timber and establishing sawmills in the vicinity of Clear Lake, with a view of carrying out a huge irrigation project in the Juniper Flat and Wapinitia country. It has now developed that the Clear Lake Lumbering & Irrigating company, composed of The Dalles business men, not only has a prior right to the water but owns the land immediately surrounding Clear Lake.

In appropriating the waters of White river, Kelly will come in contact with the Wasco Warehouse Milling company of this city. The electrical power used to operate the large flouring mills here is generated at White River falls, about 20 miles below the proposed point of diversion, and, as this company has no power to spare, any attempt to divert the waters of White or Cedar and Boulder creeks, its tributaries above their power plant, will be bitterly fought. The Smock Ditch company, a corporation owning the canal which irrigates the Smock Prairie country, will resist any attempt of Kelly or others to divert the waters of Boulder creek, as this stream is the company's sole source of supply.

Hood River Apples Selling High
There is a fairly good demand for box apples and the Hood River fruit in particular is moving out very well. From present indications there will be a serious shortage in the crop of Newtowns. Advice received here in-

dicates that the crop will be 8,000 to 10,000 boxes short of the original estimate. This being true, it will mean that Newtowns this season will not only be scarce, but high. The main supply of Hood River fruit consists of Spitzenbergs, which are very nice. They are selling at a range of \$2 to \$3, according to size. Practically all of the Hood River apples are selling at these prices. The other box apples are not moving as well. A good many receivers here think prices are bound to be higher soon, and instead of selling the fruit are putting it into storage.—Chicago Produce News.

Judge Derby's Tribute to Departed Elks
Below will be found the eulogy delivered by County Judge A. J. Derby on the occasion of the memorial services of the Dalles lodge of Elks Sunday, December 6th. Couched in simple but eloquent language Mr. Derby's tribute to the departed members of the order are as follows:
"The souls of our brothers are written upon the sands. Their virtues upon the tablets of love and memory."
"Friends and Brothers:
"We have come today, according to the time honored custom of our order, to do reverence to the memory of our absent brothers, who have grown weary of striving against the inevitable and have surrendered to the remorseless conqueror. Walking daily as we do, amid the active scenes of life, we grow careless, too often, of our better selves—forgetful of the flickering spark of immortality that lingers in our souls and binds us in kinship to Divinity. It is good for us therefore, that on occasions we appoint a time to sanctify our hearts in love and memory to our friends in heaven."
"It is sad when we search our affection for those, who in youth and manhood have given dear to us as friends, to find how thinned the number is. Yet it is no vain sorrow that causes us to feel thus, but rather a deeper self-knowledge, a closer acquaintance with our introspective selves, taught us by our association with them as they walked with us on earth."
"Each of us can recall friends now gone from earth, who have meant the better part of life and love and happiness to us. They have known us as well; they have had such sympathetic knowledge of our soul wants, our aspirations and our trials, and could give us that freedom to the interchange of secret thought for which we yearn so longingly on occasions. We have wandered with them hand in hand through the tangle-wood of life, we have seen them battle with life and its adversities, as we still must."
"We have seen their courage fail and revive again under the stimulation of affectionate counsel. We have lost our way together in the desert of life, and have mingled our voices in thanksgiving, when the oasis in the distance gave hope of delivery, and last of all, we have walked with them to the river's brink and have seen them come into their inheritance of immortality."
"Our hearts are filled with unspeakable anguish at such times, for our finite minds will not understand that they are better here; yet let us not submit to sorrow but rather bind to our hearts the lesson of patience and submission under affliction which they have so hopefully taught us, and gain strength and consolation from them. Let us learn at the grave of our lost ones how to live with the living. Let us remember that the life we are now living, the words we are daily saying, will be lived over again in memory over some future grave, and if we would truly know how to measure our words to our living friends let us see how we feel toward the dead. Let us profit by the lessons their passing teaches us, remembering that death is but a transition to a more perfect state, that life, as we know it, is but a preparation, and its short hours but a resting place between the two eternities."
"Friends and brothers, as for me, when I lay down my burden, the thought that comes to my mind is that I live again in memory in your hearts, and that you soon or late, will come to join the 'Choir Invisible' of those immortal dead, who live again in minds made better by their presence."

New York Apple Market Firm
Owing to the fog last week, which caused a large supply of apples to accumulate in the yards here that could not be brought to the dock promptly and the warm weather which prevailed during the several days succeeding, the apple market was rather dull during the opening days of this week, but with the change of weather Thursday, the trade at once improved and a better tone was manifested in the market. The receipts on Wednesday

day and Thursday were light, and this added more strength to the situation. There was a strong demand for good Baldwin, the best stock bringing from \$3.25 to \$3.75, common storage stock selling at \$3.00 to \$3.50, and No. 2, \$2.50 to \$2.75. There was a wide range on cold storage Greenings, many of which arrived in such condition that it was necessary to move them at once, and prices were from \$3.00 to \$4.50 per barrel. There were light receipts of Kings and Spitzenbergs, which brought \$3.50 to \$4.50, and of Spys that brought \$3.50 to \$4.00. The demand for Western box apples like that for barreled stock was improved by the cold weather doing the latter part of the week, and prices ranged from \$1.25 to \$2.75, for the bulk of the offerings other than Hood River, which later brought \$2.25 to \$3.00 for prime to extra fancy stock. The market was generally very firm at the close of the week, notwithstanding the dull trade during the opening days.—Fruit Trade Journal.
