## MANY PERISH IN EARTHQUAKE

75,000 PEOPLE REPORTED LOST

At Messina 12,000 Perish in Earthquake and Tidal Wave—Isle of Sicily Devastated.

Rome, Dec. 29.—A special dispatch received here from Palermo, Sicily, says the dead at Messina as the result of the earthquake and tidal wave of Monday are estimated at 12,000. Scores are still alive beneath the ruins of the city. Owing to the inadequate means of rescue at hand it will be impossible to bring these people out alive. Other dispatches received here place the dead at Messina at even more appalling figures. The Tribuna publishes a telegram saying the casualties will reach a total of 75,000 persons. This report has not been substantiated.

Twenty thousand persons were killed, according to one estimate, by an earthquake which Monday destroyed most of the human habitations on the eastern half of the island of Sicily and in the department of Calabria, Italy. It is believed to be the greatest disaster of modern times.

Reports arriving late all tend to confirm the statement that the catastrophe will equal that which occurred in 1783, when 40,000 persons perished at Messina.

Swept by Tidal Wave.

According to late advices Messina, in Sicily, was terribly damaged by the first shock and later three-fourths of the town practically was swept from the earth by a vast wave from the sea. Hundreds met death in this inundation.

Calabrian towns, Palmi, Reggio, Stilla and Bagnara are reported to have been destroyed completely, being now merely masses of ruins. Many hundreds were killed or injured in each place. It is reported that Reggio met the same fate as Messina. Mount Aetna seems to have been the center of the disturbances and that portion of Sicily within a radius of 40 miles seems to have been laid waste. It is not known whether the volcano is in action, as that section of the island is completely cut off from the world, even the railroads of the entire eastern half of the city being destroyed.

The village of Stefanianconi, the inhabitants of which number 23,000, was virtually destroyed. Only five persons were killed, but many were injured.

King and Queen to Aid.

Queen Helena has refused to allow her husband, the King, to go alone to the scene of the disaster. She said she would not give up her privilege of sharing her husband's dangers and consequently both King and Queen left Rome this afternoon for the south.

The Pope has been notified that the entire religious communities of Messina and Reggio, including bishops, priests, monks and nuns, have been wiped out by earthquake and fire.

The region devastated is subject to earthquakes and probably 250,000 persons have been killed by these phenomena in Sicily and Calabria in the last three centuries.

**ORCHARD TO TESTIFY** His Evidence May Bring About Return of \$10,800 to Gas Company.

San Francisco, Dec. 29.—By a ruling of the supreme court, the issuance of a commission was granted, authorizing the taking of the deposition of Harry Orchard, self-confessed slayer of the late Governor Stuenkel, of Idaho, as to the circumstances surrounding the explosion in this city on November 17, 1904, in the house of W. H. Linforth, then thought to be a bomb, but which resulted from the firing of a dynamite bomb, according to statements made in Orchard's confession.

The issuance of the commission follows the attempt of the gas company to recover \$10,800 paid to Linforth for damages done his house on the finding of a jury. Orchard, who is serving a life sentence in Idaho, stated that he blew up the Linforth house in an attempt to kill Captain Bradley, who then resided there.

**Conservation Work to Be Extended.** Washington, Dec. 28.—It was announced at the White House that a conference looking toward the conservation of the natural resources of North America will be held at the White House, February 18 next.

Letters suggesting the plans have been addressed by President Roosevelt to the Governor-General and to the Premier of Canada, and they will be delivered to the officials in person by Gifford Pinchot, chairman of the National Conservation Commission and Forester of the United States.

**DOINGS IN OREGON** Interesting Items Gathered From All Parts of the State.

**New Laws Proposed** Portland—Various measures of proposed legislation will be considered by the Multnomah county legislative delegation.

Members of the legislative committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce will appear before the delegation to urge the amending of the pilotage law to conform to the Port of Portland towage law. The same organization will ask for a law repealing that provision of the insurance law which requires foreign companies to deposit \$50,000 before being allowed to engage in business in this state. In the same connection the Chamber will propose another law creating the office of State Insurance Commissioner.

The Oregon Humane Society, through its officers, will ask for the indorsement by the delegation of a bill providing for an appropriation of \$3000 annually for two years for this society.

**Union Labor Advocates New Bills.** Portland—At least three measures of legislation will be proposed at the coming session of the legislature by organized labor. They are an employers' liability law, a measure providing a general eight-hour workday and a law that will put an end to the employment of convicts in competition with union labor. The bill for the employers' liability law has been prepared and the two other bills are being drafted.

These three measures have been indorsed and will be supported by the State Grange. The trade unionists and the Grange have appointed legislative committees, which will have charge of the proposed bills in the legislature.

An effort will be made to extend the provisions of the eight-hour law to apply to all classes of workmen. Such a regulation of hours of labor is now enforced as against state and county employees.

**Plan to Cut Up Lane County.** Eugene—A movement has been set on foot by the people of Cottage Grove to form a new county with that city as the county seat.

It is proposed that the line should cross the Middle Fork of the McKenzie, run near Goshen and thence west to the present boundary of the county. This would leave the Blue River mining county in Lane, while the present Bohemia district, in both Lane and Douglas, would be included within the boundaries of the new county.

From the Bohemia district in Douglas the line would run west to the coast and include within the limits of the proposed Bohemia county the towns of Foncalia, Drain and Gardiner, all of which are at present in Douglas county.

**Cannot Collect From Dunbar.** Salem—On the ground that the state has no right or title to the fees and perquisites exacted by the defendant under the statutes referred to in the complaint and that the defendant is not accountable to the state therefore, the supreme court, in an opinion written by Justice Eakin, reversed the decree of Judge William Galloway, of the circuit court, and dismissed the suit of the state against former Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar, which was brought to compel him to reimburse the state for the amount of fees and perquisites collected by him during his two terms of office and converted to his own use. The suit was brought by the state upon relation of District Attorney J. H. McNary and a decree was obtained from Judge Galloway against Dunbar for \$103,926.

**Puter Case Dismissed.** Salem—The three state land fraud cases pending against S. A. D. Puter were dismissed Monday on motion of District Attorney McNary. The statute provides that applications for the purchase of state lands must be sworn to before a notary public or a county clerk. The applications which Puter made and which were alleged to be fraudulent were sworn to before the State Land Board. Mr. McNary said that after investigating the question he is convinced that this affidavit does not constitute perjury and therefore he would dismiss the case.

**Mother Shot by Young Son.** Corvallis—Mrs. J. G. Morris was accidentally shot and killed at her home near this city Sunday afternoon. A charge from a shotgun in the hands of a 9-year-old son, who did not know the gun was loaded, severed the large artery of the right leg and the woman bled to death in a very short time. It is said that Mr. Morris is all but insane over the tragedy.

**Oregon Professor Married.** Portland—The wedding of Miss Elsa von Maderscheid, of Berkeley, Cal., and Samuel Elliot, professor of psychology at the University of Oregon, took place at the Sederborg church, San Francisco, on Monday. They will make their future home at Eugene.

A new \$70,000 high school building in Albany next year is assured by the action taken at the annual school meeting last week.

Canby poultry-raisers are preparing to organize an association and to hold a poultry show the latter part of January.

The Mothers & Teachers' Club of Milwaukie expect to open a reading room and library shortly after New Year. Books for use of the room are expected from the state library.

The First State Bank of Milwaukie has filed articles of incorporation with the clerk of Clackamas county, the capital stock being placed at \$10,000.

It has cost the people of the city of Portland over a million and a half of dollars to make Christmas merry for others and to bring good cheer to themselves.

Rodney L. West, of Portland, died of ptomaine poisoning after eating his Christmas dinner. None of the family were affected and just what portion of the food contained the poison germs is unknown.

## NEW ENTRY LAWS ON TIMBER LANDS

U. S. LAND OFFICE MAKES REVISION

Affect Unoccupied, Non-Mineral, Timber and Stone Lands and Define Method of Obtaining Title.

New regulations concerning the taking up of timber and stone lands have just been issued by the United States Land Office. As some of them are very sweeping in character we give them below for the information of our readers.

"Any lands subject to sale under the foregoing acts, may, under the direction of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, upon application or otherwise be appraised by smallest legal subdivisions, at their reasonable values, but at no less than \$2.50 an acre, and hereafter no sales will be made under said acts except as provided in these regulations.

"All reserved, unappropriated, non-mineral, surveyed, public lands within the public land states, which are valuable chiefly for the timber or stone thereon and are not subject to the date of sale, may be sold under this act at their appraised value, but in no case at less than \$2.50 per acre, in contiguous legal subdivisions upon which there is no existing mining claim or the improvement of any bona fide settler claiming under the public land laws.

"Unreserved and unappropriated lands are lands which are not included within any military, Indian, or other reservation or in a national forest, or in a withdrawal by the government for reclamation or other purposes, or which are not covered or embraced in any entry, location, selection, or filing which withdraws them from the public domain.

"Unoccupied lands are lands belonging to the United States upon which there are no improvements belonging to any person who has initiated and is properly maintaining a valid mining or other claim to such lands under the public land laws. Abandoned and unused mines, shafts, tunnels, or buildings occupied by mere trespassers not seeking title under any law of the United States do not prevent timber and stone entries if the land is otherwise capable of being so entered.

"Non-mineral lands are such lands as are not known to contain any substance recognized and classed by standard authorities as mineral, in such quantities and of such qualities as would, with reasonable prospect of success in developing a paying mine thereon, induce a person of ordinary prudence to expend the time and money necessary to such development.

"Timber is defined as trees of such kind and quantity as would, with reasonable prospect of success, be used in constructing buildings, irrigation works, railroads, telegraph and telephone lines, tramways, canals or fences, or in manufacturing shafts and tunnels, or in manufacturing but does not include trees suitable for fuel only.

"Lands valuable chiefly for timber, but unfit for cultivation are lands which are more valuable for timber than they are for cultivation in the condition in which they exist at the date of the application to purchase, and therefore include lands which could be made more valuable for cultivation by cutting and clearing them of timber. The relative values for timber or cultivation must be determined from conditions of the land existing at the date of the application to purchase.

"Lands in all public land states may be entered, but timber and stone entries can not be made in the Territories or in the District of Alaska.

"One timber and stone entry may be made for not more than 160 acres (a) by any person who is a citizen of the United States, or who has declared his intention to become such citizen, if he is not under 21 years of age, and has not already made an entry of right by reason of a former application for an entry of that kind; or has not already acquired title to or is not claiming under the homestead or desert land laws through settlement or entry made since August 3d, 1898, on other lands which, with the land he applies for, would aggregate more than 320 acres; or (b) by an association of such persons, or (c) by a corporation, each of whose stockholders is so qualified.

"A married woman may make entry if the laws of the state in which she applies permit married women to purchase and hold for themselves real estate but she must make the entry for her own benefit, and not in the interest of her husband or any other person, and she will be required to show that the money she pays for the land was not furnished by her husband.

"Any qualified person may obtain title under the timber and stone law by performing the following acts: (a) Personally examining the land desired; (b) presenting an application and sworn statement, accompanied by a filing fee of \$10; (c) depositing with the receiver the appraised price of the land; (d) publishing notice of his application and proof; (e) making final proof.

"Examination of the land must be made by the applicant in person not more than thirty days before the date of his application, in order that he may knowingly swear to its character and condition.

**Secure 18 Miles of Right of Way** The promoters of the upper valley electric railway, who have an application before the city council, have secured 15 miles of right of way for the proposed new road and are also stated to have secured stock subscriptions to the amount of several thousand dollars. The right of way obtained extends from the extreme end of the upper valley to Tucker's bridge, about five miles from this city. It is at the latter point that the new power company will develop 8000 horsepower from the Hood River.

It is stated that no action will be taken by the members of the present council, three members of which retire from office next month and that the matter of granting a franchise will be turned over to their successors.

The other franchise for an electric road which has been prepared is being held in abeyance and will be presented to the incoming council.
