

BUY WASCO LAND BUT REFUSED PAPERS

"Under No Flag, or Men Without a Country," would be an apt title for a story of the predicament of 18 Hindus residing in the vicinity of The Dalles, says the Journal. Some months ago they bought land in Wasco county and, desiring to become citizens of the United States, they applied to County Clerk F. C. Angley for Wasco county papers for declaration of intention papers.

Not knowing whether Hindus are entitled to become citizens, Mr. Angley wrote to United States Attorney Andrew J. Balliet of Seattle. Mr. Balliet held that inasmuch as the Hindus are members of the Caucasian race they are eligible to become citizens of the United States. On this advice the papers were issued. The usual fee of \$1 was charged, and the aliens renounced allegiance to all countries save the United States.

Not being entirely satisfied, Mr. Angley wrote to Richard K. Campbell, chief of the naturalization division. Mr. Campbell replied that the Hindus do not come within the provisions of section 2169 U. S. R. S., and consequently cannot be naturalized. He also requested that the Hindus return their papers to the county clerk. His the Hindus absolutely refuse to do.

"Give us back our dolls and our oath," they say, "and we will return our papers to you."

It is not known what action the government will take in regard to the recovery of the papers.

The Proper Remedy For Graft.
Word comes from Oregon to the effect that the bill which has been drawn by the State Good Roads Association for submission to the next legislature is being opposed by the

State Grange on the ground that it contains a bonding proposition which would take place the handing of a large amount of money with a limited number of State officials and leave room for graft.

The proposed bill may or may not be the kind of legislation desired by the people of Oregon, and its provisions may or may not be have been drawn carefully. The point involved in this report that interests an outsider is the fear of graft on the part of the officers who will have the management of the funds.

There can be no question that there has been sufficient reason in many sections of the country for the general public to regard the average politician as dishonest until he has proven honest. Graft in office is as ancient as society itself, but it is believed that times and men are better than they used to be, and that especially in the highway departments of the several states those charged with handling the large amounts of money that are being expended form a class of particularly upright and faithful public servants.

If grafting has been a too prevalent custom in the past, the remedy is in using greater discrimination in selecting public officials rather than by limiting development through curtailing necessary expenditures. It is not a valid reason why a man should never carry any money with him because he has had his pocket picked once, for he can keep his hand on his purse and take other precautions to guard against a repetition of the misfortune, among the wisest of which is to keep away from suspicious persons.

It is to be hoped that the people of Oregon will select trustworthy men to handle their money and then trust them to build the highways that are necessary for a continuance of their remarkable progress.—Good Roads Magazine.

In Memory of Lincoln

New York, Dec. 29.—Half a million dollars will be offered in memory of Abraham Lincoln by the people of this country between Christmas and the hundredth anniversary of his birth, according to the leaders of a national memorial movement which was started in this city today. To permanently endow the Lincoln Hospital and Home, where thousands of colored and white patients have been treated, educated and housed here for the last sixty-nine years, is the object for which American citizens in every section of the land are to be invited to devote their individual tributes to the martyred president. Seventy-five thousand dollars has today been promptly subscribed in this city to start this fund and its completion in time for the centenary celebrations declared to be assured when the people of other cities and states learn of the project.

In crumpled dollar bills and stamps as well as substantial checks, the working committee of this new Lincoln memorial movement are preparing to receive the response of the people from end to end of the country to the Christmas call for a living monument of Lincoln. Thousands of white and colored persons, who have alike received the free treatment, care and relief of the institution since long before the Civil War, are today enlisting in the movement to perpetuate it in Lincoln's name. From the infirm old people who are weaving baskets for the fund in the home wards to the corps of a hundred graduate nurses who are spreading its relief in every part of the country, a volunteer army of beneficiaries will work to secure the future of this unique hospital in the name of the great emancipator.
