## ROOSEVELT ON WAY TO AFRICA HE IS DUE AT NAPLES APRIL 3

Immense Crowd Sees Former President Off at Hoboken Pier With Cheers.

New York, March 23.—Out on the "bosom of the ocean," as the writers have it, is Theodore Roosevelt with his party of lion hunters. They are aboard the Hamburg-American line steamer Hamburg, which cast off her lines from her Hoboken pier this morning and to the music of the whistles of numerous ferryboats, tugs and other vessels sailed down the bay with her distinguished passenger.

Accompanying Mr. Roosevelt are his son, Kermit Roosevelt; Major Edward A. Mearns, medical corps, U. S. A., retired; Edmund Heller and J. Alden Loring. The last named three men accompanying Mr. Roosevelt as representative of the Smithsonian Institution, while the younger Roosevelt is official photographer of the expedition.

The long pier to which the Hamburg was moored was jammed with persons gathered to see the Roosevelt party sail. They made the pier ring with their cheers for the voyager from the time of his arrival from New York City until the Hamburg sailed.

Two Fine Ships Carry Party. The Hamburg is due at Naples on April 3. Mr. Roosevelt and his party will remain in the Italian city two days, sailing thence on the Admiral of the German East African line on April 5. The Hamburg is

one of the finest vessels of the Hamburg-American line and is the favorite ship of the German emperor. The Admiral is her equal in all the comforts and conveniences needed for the hot trip through the Suez canal, down the Red Sea and along the moist and sticky coast of East Africa. The Admiral is due at Mombasa, where the Roosevelt party will disembark, on April 22.

On his arrival at Mombasa Mr. Roosevelt and his party will go direct to the estate of Sir Alfred Pease, a member of the well known English Quaker family, which is situated at Kilima Theki, Kapitai Plains, British East African Protectorate, and remain there for three months during the heavy rains.

Will Visit American in Africa. Afterward the Roosevelt party will go to Nairobi and pay a visit to the estate of Philip MacMillan, who is head of an American company that has a concession of 100 square miles in the district. They will cross Lake Victoria early in December to enter Uganda when the dry season commences in order to do the 37 days' march to Gondokoro in fine weather.

It is expected that the Roosevelt expedition will complete its trip through the dark continent in the spring of next year, reaching Cairo about April 1, 1910.

## Buy 1000 Acres on West Side.

F. S. Stanley yesterday confirmed the report that Oscar Vanderbilt had purchased 1,000 acres of land at Parkertown, on the west side and said Mr. Vanderbilt wanted that much more. He will not be led into small tracts and put it on the market. The following account of the transfer appeared in the Oregonian:

Oscar Vanderbilt Friday concluded a deal with the Stanley-Smith Lumber Company for 1,000 acres situated in Hood River valley, about 6½ miles from town. The lumber company out the timber from the tract, leaving only the grubbing out of stumps to be done to make the tract available for the planting of apple orchards.

The present value of Hood River valley lands, improved, is about \$1,000 an acre, but just what the purchase price of this big tract is could not be accurately stated. Two Portland capitalists are interested with Mr. Vanderbilt in the transaction, which closed at a figure approximately estimated at from \$85,000 to \$90,000. It is the announced intention of the owners to place the tract on the market in small farms.

This transaction is the largest single deal for land in the valley for many years and Mr. Vanderbilt says he thinks it is the biggest deal made since the valley became famous as an apple-growing section of the state. He has been in the valley for about five years and has made a success in apple growing and small fruit culture. The fact that he has acquired this big tract would seem to prove beyond doubt his entire faith in the section.

## NINTH ANNUAL DIST. CONVENTION

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS LODGE Hold Afternoon and Evening Sessions Followed by Banquet at The Hall.

Saturday the ninth annual convention of the Knights of Pythias lodge of the Eighth Oregon district, was held at their hall in this city, and there were 108 visitors and their ladies present.

Considerable preparation was made by the members of Wauna Lodge to entertain the visitors, and reception committees were at the train to welcome the arriving delegates, and they were well taken care of. Every train arriving during the day, both east and west, brought delegates, the Portland delegation arriving in the morning, with it the grand officers, who were Gus C. Moser, grand chancellor, J. M. Curl, of Albany, past grand chancellor, Judge G. R. Morrow and Frank Grant, of Portland. Soon after dinner at the New Hotel Wauna the visitors who had arrived were taken in automobiles for a ride through the valley, and they were enthusiastic over the trip, some of them having seen the valley for the first time. They were returned in time for the afternoon session, which was held after the arrival of the local train from the east. The session in the afternoon was an open meeting for the Knights and Pythian Sisters, to which a few invited guests were present. District Deputy W. C. Brock presided. The first number on the program was a violin solo by Wm. Chandler, accompanied on the piano by Mrs. H. L. Dumble. The selections were heartily applauded. Mayor McDonald was then introduced, making an address of welcome in a few well chosen words, which assured the visitors of the hearty welcome given them by the people as well as the lodge.

Prof. Epping sang a solo in his usual charming way, accompanied by Miss Eva Brock on the piano. Grand Chancellor Moser made the principal address of the afternoon, his talk being on the growth of the order, the good it accomplished in a fraternal way, and he was listened to with marked attention.

John M. Curri, past grand chancellor, followed, following up a few of the points of the discourse of Mr. Moser, and bringing out illustrations of the duties and benefits of the members of the order.

A solo by Paul Hubbard, with Elmer Root at the piano, made a pleasing diversion and was much enjoyed. Frank Menefee made a short address on the good of the order, paying Hood River a fine compliment, saying that he never failed to sound the praises of the valley whenever he had an opportunity.

Little Lillian Brock sang a pretty song which would have done credit to a much older girl, and she was loudly applauded.

Frank Grant proved to be the wit of the session, and while his remarks were short, owing to the lateness of the hour, it put the audience in good humor, and the meeting was adjourned with everybody feeling glad they were there.

The secret work of the order was exemplified after supper on several candidates, and shortly after eleven o'clock the Knights retired to the hall below, where the Pythian Sisters had prepared a fine banquet. The tables were arranged on the form of a triangle, the emblem of the order, while American flags adorned the walls and stage. Palms were placed at intervals and the tables were decorated with flowers. The menu was all of home cooking, and consisted of oyster cocktail, salted wafers; chicken pie, tart jelly; mashed and brown potatoes; peas, hot rolls, pickles, celery; salad on lettuce leaf; asparagus; cranberry and ice cream; coffee and Hood River apples.

District Deputy Brock was toast master and toasts were responded to by Rev. W. C. Gilmore, who made an address of welcome. R. G. Morrow spoke on Pythian fraternity. John Gavin took for his theme, local Pythianism. H. M. Cake, supreme representative, took up the social side of Pythianism. Judge W. L. Bradshaw spoke of the good work of the Pythian Sisters. The concluding speech of the evening was by Grand Chancellor Moser, who told of Pythian work.

A Covent Garden dealer who sells hundreds of thousands of bushels of American apples states that the Oregon fruit is pushing the ordinary American variety out of the market."
