UNDERWOOD.

It keeps several teams busy hauling the freight away from the Underwood docks now days. The "Iron" drew several inches less water after unloading there Friday night, and a good part of her cargo is left here every trip. R. C. In said district, said bonds comprising a third series or issue of the bonds of said district voted October 3, 1907, and sealed proposals for said bonds will be received by said board at said place for the purchase of said bonds until the day and hour mentioned, at which time the board will open the proposals and award the purchase of said bonds to the highest responsible bidder, the board reserving the right to reject any and all bids. All bids must be accompanied by certified check for ten per cent of amount of said bonds for which the bids are submitted.
