HOOD RIVER PREPARES FOR DAY

Memorial Sermon Will be Preached by Dan Shannon, at the Tabernacle Sunday

Extensive preparations are being made to observe Memorial Day which will be held on Monday this year, as the 30th falls on Sunday.

Sunday morning, May 30, the Memorial sermon will be preached by Dan Shannon at the Tabernacle, at the usual hour. The comrades of Canby Post and the members of the Woman's Relief Corps will meet on the Park street school grounds at 10:30 sharp and march in a body to the Tabernacle, a block away.

Special preparations for Monday morning, May 31, promises to be better than the usual program held here in Hood River and all should lay aside their work and attend the exercises held to commemorate the day.

The Post and Relief Corps will meet at the Hersey's corner, near the cemetery at 10 in the morning, and march in a body to Idlewild cemetery, where the memorial services of the Grand Army of the Republic will be held over the grave of their late comrade, Enoch Cornell, after which the graves of all old soldiers will be strewn with flowers.

According to the general orders from the Commander in Chief, of the graves of all Confederate soldiers will not be forgotten in strewing flowers. All old soldiers are cordially invited to fall in with Canby Post and take part in the exercises.

Lincoln's address, delivered by him at Gettysburg, November 19, 1863, will be given, and is in part as follows:

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HOOD RIVER WILL CELEBRATE

CELEBRATION HELD ON JULY 5

Organization Units in Making This the Event of All Events Ever Held Here

At the adjourned meeting of the Commercial Club held last Friday evening it was decided to hold a grand and glorious celebration in Hood River and as the Fourth comes on Sunday it was decided to hold the celebration on Monday, July 5.

A committee of five members were appointed by the chairman, Mr. Early, who will have full charge of the affairs and they are going at the preparations with a will. Let all assist in any way when called upon by the committee.

The following are the members of the executive committee and it is in their hands that the Hood River district may expect to have one of the best celebrations ever held here. They have selected the grounds on the hill which was used two years ago. This will give the citizens plenty of room to celebrate and give the eagle a chance to stretch her wings and scream all she wants to.

The committee is Messrs. Dick McDonald, Chas. N. Clarke, A. L. Carmichael, Geo. Thompson, and J. P. Cunniff.

It was also decided that a street festival be held some time in June about the 15th, and a committee consisting of three was appointed by the chairman: Arthur Clarke, H. Heilbronner, and James H. Hunt, who are to confer with the members of the Woman's Club and arrange for dates, and the details, and it is needless to say that the festival will be a success.

The matter of a location for the Commercial Club rooms was taken up but nothing definite was decided. A special meeting of the Club will be called before a final decision will be made.

A communication from Culbertson & Co., was received in regard to the hotel Kanona property, which is for sale at \$10,000.00, this property consists of the hotel, which rents for \$85 per month, and the sample room on the south. The lot is 100x100 feet and is considered a good buy at the price wanted. This sample room could be fitted up very nicely, both up stairs and down and would give the Commercial Club plenty of room for a number of years while the rent from the hotel would pay the interests on the investment. Later when the Club decided to build of brick they could do so and would have one of the best buildings in the city.

The advantage of owning their own building instead of paying rent is so prominent that it needs no argument.

The next proposition was from John Leland Henderson, and was in regard to a lot that he has for sale.

This is also considered a good buy but this would mean that the Club would have to build at once if they purchased the lot.

The next proposition was from the First National Bank but was considered too high for the Club to handle and the bank was made a counter proposition which was left to the bank directors of the bank to accept or reject and was the subject of the Commercial Club at the special meeting which is to be called so that all members will be present.

L. M. Blowers made the Club the best proposition. He is going to build somewhat larger than he planned if the Club will lease the upper half of his building for a term of two years at \$1,000 in advance. The only disadvantage in this is the location, which is near the livery stables and just in front of a feed barn, and should the Commercial Club decide on this location, and perhaps give a swell banquet, say in July or August, the odors that would permeate the air would cause Spence, W. to be present, to change his mind when he wrote:

Messaged I smell a garden of sweet flowers, That dainty odors from them three arose.

Any location in Hood River is good—the only advantage of buying outright would be to save paying rent and rent as every one knows is throwing so much to the birds. However the Glacier will be satisfied with any selection that the Commercial Club finally decides upon, so do not ask us to decide the matter.
