Mrs. Friedrich returned on Wednesday from Carson, where she has been spending several months at the Miner's Springs.

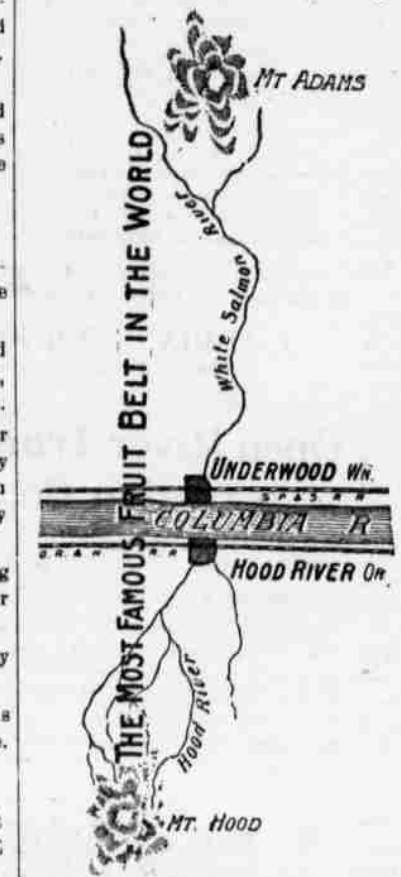
F. W. Dehart made a business trip to White Salmon Monday.
