#### ORDINA CE FOR BON ELECTION

WATER QUESTION UP IN NOVEMBER

Bill Passes First Reading-Mayor Submits Correspondence with State Health Board.

The city council Monday night was mostly concerned with the consideration of the water question and an ordinance, which passed first reading, was introduced calling for an election some time in November at which the question of isuing water bonds to the extent of \$90,000 would be submitted to the voters. A petition signed by 132 citizens and taxpayers, asking for such an election was submitted to the council and Mayor McDonald submitted to the city fathers some cor-respondence which had passed be-tween him and the state board of health. The correspondence will be found in another column of this paper and the Mayor's communication to the council follows:

To The Hon. Council,

Hood River Oregon,

Gentlemen: I hand you here with communication from the State Health board. In it they refer to a letter to them from the Mayor. I at-tach a copy of that letter and their answer thereto. They claim to have been misquoted by me and as they have made absolute denial of the items I took exception to. Their recort may be coonsidered as amended in that particular. There is one point that they have made plain is that the water is impure and that the source of supply is bad and was known to be bad when it was first used. You must either get a supply of better water or else sewer all portions of the city that affects the drainage into the present supply, which will mean completing all sewers already laid out and creating a new district covering that portion of the city lying between the present sewer district and the west boundary of the city and from the city limits on the south and the O. R. & N. Railway on the north, and take steps to prevent impure or contamination water being brought in from the outside and sold for domes-tic use. This action is mandatory on the part of the state bealth board. They have made it clear that you must act or be responsible for the

To The Honorable Mayor and Com-mon Council, of the City of Hood River, Oregon:

Gentlemen :- The undersigned, y committee on sewers, have since the last meeting of the Common Council, been giving particular attention to the matter of sanitation within the perperate limits of the city, and es pecially that phase of it coming under the jurisdiction of your committee. In a growing municipality like ours it is always a problem to meet the in-creasing needs for protection to the health of its citizens, without in-creasing the burdens to be imposed creasing the burdens to be imposed upon the property owners to an unbearable extent by special and local assessments; the present conditions throughout the city require, undoubtedly that the sewerage of the entire city be brought to and kept at its highest efficiency to guard against disease from accumulations of filth in various places in the city, many of which have not as yet come to light and particularly to meet the demands of the state board of health with referee to that portion of the city nat-

erece to that portion of the city nat-urally draining toward the Light & Water Company's main reservoir in the city limits.

Realizing the necessity of these and the demand tor prompt and efficaloss action, your committee at this body that all the territory in the city limits not already sewered, be brought under the general sewer ordinance and that such portions as are not within any established sewer district in the city be viewed and sewer districts created by the proper committee from this council.
