Many people have been here already and there are more to come who were attracted by the Seattle exhibit. Sammie G. Blythe, the writer, was here Saturday, paid a compliment to Mr. Wilson in saying that he was the best posted man on fruit whom he found at the exhibition and that he was able to get more satisfactory information regarding the fruit industry and conditions from Mr. Wilson than from any other source.

**WHITE SALMON.**

The directors of the Fruit Growers' Union met pursuant to call a Mr. Lewis' office last Saturday afternoon for the purpose of receiving the final report of the strawberry shipments, and discussing plans for the future.

The Union under the management of Mr. Lewis, was very successful in marketing their crops of berries this season. Most of the growers shipping through the union averaged considerably over three dollars per crate (or their entire crop). The work which the union did for the individual grower is an evidence of the place which the union ought to have in the minds of all the growers.

The directors discussed the question of a cold storage building to take care of the future apple crop and a committee was appointed to look after the matter.

Mr. and Mrs. O. W. Mullen, of Minneapolis, spent last week visiting Mrs. Mullen's cousin, A. H. Jewett, at this place. Mr. and Mrs. Mullen will probably locate here in the near future.

Mr. M. Thompson spent several days last week visiting his sons here and looking over the valley. Mr. Thompson and his sons will probably put in a flour mill on the railroad near the station if a siding can be secured from the railroad company.

Mr. and Mrs. C. W. J. Beckers returned from a four weeks stay at their Seattle home visiting the fair.

**Notice of Street Improvement.**

Notice is hereby given that the undersigned, Mayor of the City of Hood River, will receive bids at his office in said city on the 26th day of October, 1909, for the improvement of Twelfth Street from the intersection with the south line of State Street south to May Street; May Street from the intersection of the east line of Twelfth Street eastward south to the intersection of the west line of Twelfth Street westward north, and Twelfth Street from its intersection with the north line of May Street south to the city limits said improvement having been provided for by ordinance No. 196 of the City of Hood River, Oregon, passed by the Common Council on the 15th day of June, 1909, and approved by the Mayor on the 21st day of June, 1909, and ordinance No. 212 amended said ordinance, passed by the Common Council the 19th day of July, 1909, and approved by the Mayor on the 20th day of July, 1909. The width of the roadway to be so improved being as follows:

The roadway on Twelfth Street from its intersection with the south line of State Street south to the south line of May Street shall be 80 feet wide from curb line to curb line. The width of the roadway on May Street from the intersection of the east line of Twelfth Street extended south to the intersection of the west line of Twelfth Street extended north, shall be 60 feet wide; and the width of the roadway of Twelfth Street from its intersection with the north line of May Street south to the city limits shall be 80 feet wide. Said improvement to be made by macadamizing said streets and by constructing cement gutters and curbs along the curb line of said streets as provided in said ordinance No. 196 and 212. The work of improving said streets shall be let in one contract and the plans and specifications for improving said streets in accordance with said ordinance, shall be cause out in general ordinance No. 194 of the City of Hood River, Oregon, passed by the Common Council on the 15th day of June, 1909, and approved by the Mayor on the 21st day of June, 1909, which ordinance contains the plans and specifications which shall be seen and examined by those desiring to take up said work at the office of the City Engineer in said city. Said work shall be completed within sixty days from the date of letting the contract therefor. Said bids or proposals will be opened and considered by the street committee of the City of Hood River, Oregon, on the 26th day of October, 1909, and report the same with the summary thereof to the Common Council at its next regular meeting thereafter. The person, firm or corporation to whom the contract is let will be required to sign an agreement to the effect that said contractor shall look alone for payment of material and work to such particular portion of the fund to be assessed upon the property liable to pay such improvements, and paid into the city treasury for that purpose, as shall be assessed to the property in front of which and to the charge of which the particular part of the improvement is to be done by the successful bidder or bidder respectively, to be made and collected and paid in to the city treasury, and that such contractor shall in no event require the City of Hood River or any of its officers to pay the same except out of such particular portion of said funds so assessed and collected in the city treasury, and for such portion or portions of such improvements, nor seek to enforce payment of the same or any part thereof against the City of Hood River or of its officers by any legal process or otherwise.


The right to reject any or all bids is expressly reserved by the Common Council of the City of Hood River and no bid will be received after the time stated in this notice. Bids must state opposite to each block or tract bid upon, the price for each class of work separately, and no bids will be received which specifies more than one price for each class of work charged to one block in length. The word "block" as used in this notice, shall be construed to mean all property on both sides of the street to be improved, chargeable for the improvement of that part of such street lying between the center line of cross streets intersecting the street to be improved. All bids shall correspond accurately as possible with the specifications set out in said general ordinance No. 194 of the City of Hood River, accompanying each bid there shall be a written guaranty signed by at least two responsible taxpayers of the city, to be approved by the chairman or committee on streets to the effect that, if a contract be awarded to such bidder he will enter into the contract as required and give security for its faithful performance within forty-eight hours after receiving notice of such award; or such contractor shall forfeit and pay to the City of Hood River the difference between such bid and the next highest responsible bid for the same work. Said contract to be let by the Common Council to the lowest responsible bidder, who will be required to give a bond to the City of Hood River in such sum as may be determined upon by the Council, not exceeding the contract price, conditioned for the faithful performance of the work, to the satisfaction of the street commissioner and committee on streets, with one or more sureties approved by the Council.

This notice is published by order of the Common Council for ten days in the Hood River Glacier, a newspaper of general circulation in said city, the date of first publication being the 16th day of October, 1909, and the date of the last publication the 26th day of October, 1909; and all persons desiring to recommend against said improvements at any time within said ten days, and the same will be transmitted to the Common Council at its next regular meeting, to be considered according to law.
