The Commercial Club is doing a wonderful work for the whole of Hood River, valley and town. It should receive the support of every resident. If you are in business it helps your business, if you own a farm it makes it more valuable and advertises your products and if you have only your job the Commercial club is causing the community to grow so that you will have the opportunity of bigger and better jobs. The club should have at least 500 members and at the rate they are joining it will soon have that many. So far the club has not had much to offer in the shape of immediate pleasures, but with the occupation of the new club rooms, which will be on the second floor of the new First National Bank building, many enjoyable privileges will be afforded the members. Billiard, card and reading rooms will be a feature and there will come portable lounging and rest rooms for both men and women. An assembly hall will be available for meetings of various sorts and altogether the club will be a source of pride which every loyal Hood Riverite should support.

CONCERNING EASTERN EXHIBITS.

A letter has been received by Mrs. F. E. Horton, of Omaha, Neb., in which the latter tells of her disappointment at not seeing Hood River represented at the recent Omaha Corn Show. She wrote: "We went all over the show to look for Hood River apples. We did find exhibits from Rogue River, North Yakima and Wenatchee. The people of these places never miss an opportunity to advertise their products. But we did not find a box of Hood River apples." Mr. Horton, who is the Western Union Time Service man in Omaha, owns a ranch here in Paradise farm. A Harbison Lines representative at the show told them that exhibits had been solicited all over Oregon with very little success.

Of course, it is unfortunate that Hood River cannot be represented at all the big eastern gatherings, but there are so many opportunities offered to place exhibits that care must be exercised in choosing the ones likely to give the best results for the money expended. We understand that the management of the Corn Show charged \$2 per square foot for exhibit space so that if Hood River had taken space for a carload exhibit such as was put on a Chicago car for space alone would have been \$228. A smaller space would have been used but the rates were very high and the cost of a proper exhibit would have been out of proportion with the results. The drawback to most of the eastern exhibits is the disposition of the management of the show to try and hold up the districts which wish to display.

Instructions to Road Users.
A novel and unusual method calling attention to the proper way in which to use a road has been put in operation by the State Highway Engineer, A. N. Johnson, of Illinois. It consists of a card bearing the following legend:

HOW TO KEEP THIS ROAD GOOD FOR YEARS—DON'T DRIVE IN ONE TRACK—AVOID MAKING RUTS.
This road was constructed for your use. If all use one place all the wear will be in one place and make a rut.
If you use a little care and do not drive exactly where the last wagon did the wear will be distributed which will keep the surface smooth and the road will remain good for years. Otherwise it will soon be rutted and the smooth surface gone.
The cards are 3 1/2 by 5 1/2 inches in size, and are given to the men in charge of road work for distribution to be used. The cards call direct attention to the subject and seems to be more effective than placards tacked at the side of the road. Instead of a hasty glance in passing, the patrons of the roads put the cards in their pockets to be read and given more mature consideration.
