

She wrote: "We went all over the show to look for Hoed River apples. We did find exhibits from Rogue River, North Yakima and Wenatchee. The people of these places never miss an opportunity to advertise their products. But we did not find a box of Hood River apples."

Mr. Horton, who is the Western Union Time Service man in Omsha, owns a ranch here in Paradise farm. A Harriman Lines representative at the show told them that exhibits had been solicited all over Oregon with very little success.




