**THE MUSE OF THE TROPICAL JUNGLE**

D. D. Crosby, son of J. R. Crosby, of Odell, a Hood River boy who is in the army serving in the Philippines, has sent the Glacier what he calls a "semi-poem from life in the Philippines." The verses which are printed below reflect some of the features of soldier life in the tropics. Mr. Crosby, who writes from Jolo Jolo, says he may send a similar one next month. The letter was six weeks in transit.
