

**ADVOCATES A HIGHER SALARY**

Editor Glacier—Some reference having been made to my candidacy for the office of County Judge of Hood River County, a few plain statements may now be in order.

I have been a resident of the State of Oregon for 33 years, and a resident of Hood River valley for more than 20 years. I have property interest in Riverside Farm three miles west of town, and an equity in about 60 lots in the city of Hood River. I represented Sherman and Wasco Counties in the House in 1898 and 1899 as a Republican, during special and regular sessions of the Legislature. Several bills were introduced by me and some of them became laws and remain on the statute books to this day. One is for the protection of the beautiful silver gray squirrel, often seen in the Hood River valley. Also a general curative act, and the horticultural law. I believe a public office is a public trust, not only so, I think the laborer is worthy of his hire, and in this connection let me ask if you think the small sum of three hundred dollars per year is sufficient salary for the County Judge of Hood River County, in which is located the most famous and fertile valley in the world; where grow the finest apples and strawberries, superb orchards sell for \$2000 per acre and an assessed valuation in the county of ten to twelve million dollars. Would it not seem just a little awkward if, perchance, the county seat should be located at some interior point far from the business center of the county, and the county Judge should be compelled to strike camp in a tent and with frying pan ever ready, cook and prepare his own meals. It is likely he would not be able to travel by auto to any great extent, and quite certain he would have no extended use for the modern flying machine backed by this princely sum. In my business career, covering nearly 25 years, I have done considerable contracting, and found it wise to become familiar with the terms of the contract before entering into its performance, so I deem it proper to say in this connection, that I do not feel that I could afford to give my time and energy necessary to meet the demands of said office, for less than \$1500 per year.

The County Judge of Jackson County Oregon, receives \$1800 per year. Many ordinary bookkeepers receive nearly as large a sum as this for their services. I do not think it urgent to enter into a lengthy discussion of the political issues of the day. However, I have to say that the mere fact of holding an assembly does not constitute an unlawful act, but is in accordance and within the scope and meaning of the direct primary law of the State of Oregon. There can be no harm in an assembly of the voters of a party or of a voluntary assembly, providing each and every member thereof is allowed a free and untrammelled expression of his political views. Under these conditions every candidate recommended for office by a party assembly is clearly within his rights. It is just as true that every candidate for public office who is nominated by petition, is within the scope and meaning of the direct primary law of our state. So far as the law is concerned, their rights, duties and privileges are on an equal

footing. Those persons who have signed, as candidate statement No. 1, have a right to the exercise of that personal privilege, but statement No. 1 has nothing to do with the office of County Judge. But very few things of any great importance, have been accomplished in this world without organization. Every organized body must have a leader, who, with the assistance of his associates is enabled to promote the welfare of mankind. I believe in patriotism of the kind that upholds, protects and defends the Constitution of the United States of America; I believe in progressive Republicanism, ever supporting the advance guard of modern achievement; I believe in progress of the kind that takes on practical business application to public affairs and in a civilization that securely upholds equality and justice. I am not a candidate for the office of County Judge of Hood River County.
