Aaron Burr's Grave.

Anron Burr died at Port Richmond, Staten Island, Sept. 14, 1836. His remains were conveyed to Princeton, N. J., where, according to his request, he was interred at the feet of his father and grandfather. Both his father and grandfather were presidents of Princeton college.

Concerning the tombstone which marks his burial place, we quote from the history of his life by Parton: "Some efforts were made and some money subscribed soon after his death to procure a sultable monument, but the project failed. No one in the town saw the monument erected or knew anything whatever respecting it. There was no stonecutter in the vicinity capable of execut ing the work. The stone bears the in scription: 'Aaron Burr. Born Febru ary, 6, 1756. Died, September 14, 1836."-Philadelphia Press.
