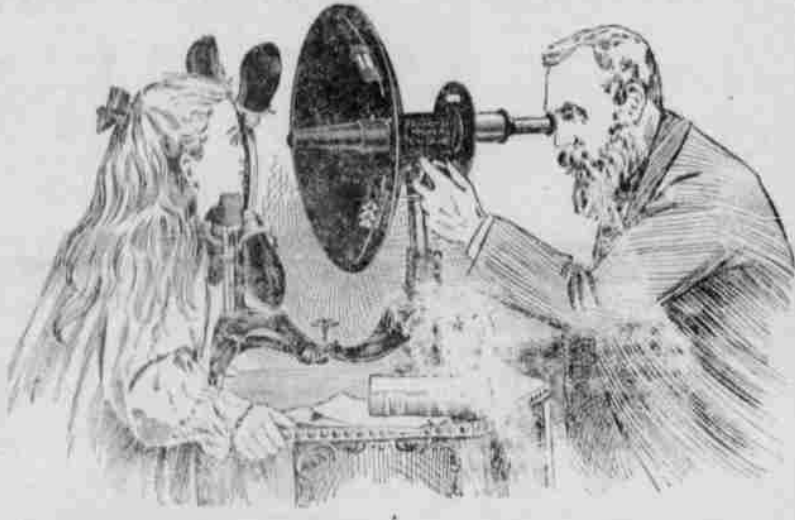

SEASON'S FOREST FIRES SHOW LITTLE DAMAGE

Six prompt arrests and convictions in Washington, several more in the other northwestern states, and such decisive organized work on all fires by the several public and private agencies that little loss has been sustained, mark the opening of the 1911 forest fire season. Advisers received the first of the week by the Western Forestry & Conservation Association from nearly all states, government and private protective agencies report that the recent hot weather has brought dangerous conditions almost everywhere, and that small fires are already numerous, but nearly all have been extinguished or confined to slashings and old burns. There has been considerable loss of settlers' improvements and logging equipment carelessly left surrounded by inflammable material but comparatively little injury to standing timber. Covering last year's experience, fires serious enough to be alarming began first in Oregon, where in Linn and Clackamas counties about \$70,000 worth of logging equipment and the property of several settlers have been destroyed by slashing fires which were, however, soon brought under control by a large force employed by the Forest Service and by private companies. Many other fires throughout the state which caused exaggerated reports also proved to be chiefly on open lands. Organization of the state's patrol system under the new law is practically complete there being state fire wardens in 22 counties. Timber owners connected with the Oregon Forest Fire Association have about 250 patrolmen. In response to petitions from property owners some of the counties are also hiring patrolmen. The state has applied to the Secretary of Agriculture for \$10,000 under the Weeks law which authorizes the expenditure of this sum by the Government in co-operation with any state which will add a like amount.

UNDERWOOD AND HOOD MARKET PEACHES

The fruit prospects of the Underwood and Hood sections of Skamania county are excellent, says F. W. DeHart, a merchant and rancher of Hood, who was in this city Monday. Orchardists are expecting a good return from this year's crop he states. The peach crop has made an excellent showing this season. The early varieties have mostly all been marketed and the later peaches will be ready for picking within three weeks. The product finds a ready market in Portland and the growers are receiving satisfactory prices. Jno. Wendorff, one of the largest peach growers in the vicinity, recently put into commission an automobile truck to move his crop to the railroad station. It is the first machine for this work that has been installed in the region, but has proven extremely satisfactory.

Vanderbilt Loses Orchard Case.

United States Judge Wolverton decided the famous Vanderbilt Hood River orchard case Monday by finding for Minette Thullen Bishop and Joseph C. Thullen, the purchasers of the orchard, on every point. The deed of sale and contract between Oscar and Barbara Vanderbilt on the one hand and Mrs. Bishop and Thullen on the other, whereby they were to pay \$43,000 to the Vanderbilts for the orchard, is rescinded. Vanderbilt has to pay back the \$10,000 that had been paid on the purchase price and \$1736 expended by the purchasers on the place, together with interest at 6 per cent and all costs and disbursements of the suit. In addition the defendants and cross-complainants are given a lien on the property to insure the carrying out of the decree.—Portland Journal.

W. N. WHITE PREDICTS SLIGHT INCREASE

W. N. White, after a consideration of the apple situation all over the United States last week, states that augmented by the products of new bearing orchards in Virginia and West Virginia, the crop this year should aggregate considerably over 28,575,000 barrels. He based this estimate upon the Government report of July 1, which, he says, represented the condition at 59.9 as compared with 49.6 on July 1, 1910. The yield that year, Mr. White says, amounted to 23,825,000 barrels and the conclusions arrived at by him are based upon these figures and other data which he has collected. Discussing the outlook in Europe the coming year, Mr. White remarked: "Conditions are far different there this season than last when crops in England and France had suffered considerably from weather conditions. There were very few apples in these then, practically no cherries and only bad crops of plums and Green Gages. Tasmanian apples were marketed in June and all apples from Spain and Portugal realized high prices, so that everything during August and September brought the highest figures known for many years." "All through Europe, England, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany there are good crops of cherries and in some countries heavy crops of plums, particularly in England and France, and any quantity of Green Gages in France and Italy. In addition to these, 100,000 boxes of Tasmanian apples are scheduled to arrive in England during this month.—Fruit Trade Journal and Produce Record.
