SPRINKLER IRRIGATION FOR CENTRAL VALE

The most complete system for orchard irrigation in the Hood River Valley is being installed on the lands of the Central Orchard Co. where water furnished by the East Fork Irrigating Co. will be available at hydrant pressure on every part of the 250 acres.

Nearly one-half of the tract which is located in Central Vale, eight miles south of Hood River has been sold during the past summer and the water is being piped to the highest point of each lot so that it will be possible to have a system of sprinklers for irrigation instead of using ditches and rills. The sprinkler system is much more effective and results in a great economy of water, especially on sloping lands.
