CONSUL GIVES DATA ON ENGLISH SALES

During the last three months of 1910, 517 tons of apples were purchased by local dealers at the Liverpool and Manchester auctions, writes Frederick I. Bright, United States Consul at Huddersfield, England. Some of the leading American apples were Baldwins, Newtowns, Northern Spies, York Imperials, Kings, Wallbridges, Jonathans and Greenings. Well-known Canadian apples are Northern Spies, Gravensteins, Snows, Wealthy and Colverts. During November and December, 1910, the average prices per barrel paid at the Lancashire sales were: Newtowns, \$4.95 and \$1.89 per box; Baldwins, \$4.44; Northern Spies, \$4.82; York Imperials, \$4.44, and Kings, \$4.87. The average weight of a box is about 40 pounds, and the standard barrel is estimated to have a gross weight of 150 to 160 pounds, yet many barrels are received weighing 140 pounds. The present method of selling fruit through the Lancashire commission sales has its advantages both to exporters and buyers, but owing to the extra costs involved in handling and transportation, many wholesale dealers who would prefer to import direct, providing they could depend upon regular shipments of reliable, well-graded and carefully packed fruit.

Thompson Makes Prediction for Yakima. Basing his prediction on the large number of fruit spurs being formed this year, Thompson predicts that the crop which will come into bearing for the first time, Fred Thompson of the Thompson Fruit Company thinks that there will be next year a total of 7000 carloads of apples from the Yakima valley. Thompson makes this prediction in spite of the fact that this year his estimates of the total crop are lower than most of those being made. Thompson says that this is the year in which an average of about 10 per cent of the normal crop may be expected. Next year 160 per cent of the normal may again be expected, which with the young trees, will make the total of 7000 carloads for 1913, and about 10,000 carloads in 1914—Yakima Republic.

Mosier Prizes Go to New York. The output of Mosier's prime crop, with the exception of one ear which went to Kansas City, was bought this year by Steinhardt & Kelley, of New York. The result is that the growers receive about ten cents per box more than they ever received before.—Mosier Bulletin.
