O. A. C. GRADUATES ARE IN DEMAND

The big demand for college graduates in all sorts of positions is well indicated by the number of O. A. C. men who have been called to important posts since leaving college. Max Adams McCall of Seio, 19, who has been teaching agriculture and manual training in a high school at Davenport, Wash., has been assistant in agronomy at his alma mater, succeeding Henry A. Hoyt of Garrettsburg, Pa., who goes to the University of Arizona for similar work.

E. C. Galloway of Spokane, Wash., who got his master's degree in the pharmacy department last June, is the new city milk chemist of Portland. Hugh McCall, a former student at the college, has gone to the position of cashier to the Cove State Bank from the LaGrande National Bank.

O. L. Lance, another O. A. C. boy is now president of a stock company for the manufacture of a new improved railroad switch which can be operated from the engine thus promising prevention of many switch wrecks and saving time and expense.

John Quincy Adams, of Sheboygan, Wis., who graduated last June, is manager and superintendent of Mackintosh Manor, Superior, Mont., a large fruit ranch, at an excellent salary. Otto Elmer of Mulino, also '11, is supervisor of a 129 acre tract of fruit land at Wren with A. F. Lafky of Salem, was employed this summer on government work in pre-cooling.

H. E. Walberg of Lents, and S. B. Hall of Cleone will teach agriculture in high schools at Los Angeles, Cal., and Raymond Loosely of Ft. Klamath will be likewise at Ferndale, Cal. F. L. Griffin of Canby will be at Boise, Ida., in the same work, and Laura Hill-Griffin at Fayette, Ida.

Cornell Students Study Packing.
E. L. Markell and H. R. Davis, of Baltimore, Md., and E. C. Auchter, of Rochester, N. Y., arrived in this city last week to spend a short time making a study of Hood River's pack.

All of the young men, who are students at the Agricultural Department of Cornell University, have been making a tour of the principal apple sections of the United States this summer. They visited the citrus fruit district of California and came here from Medford, where they studied pear packing.

"The Hood River pack is considered one of the best, in the East," said Mr. Davis, "and it is possible that it will be introduced to a great extent in the near future by growers for making the pack of their fancy fruit."

FISHERMEN MUST PRESENT LICENSES

Hunting or fishing upon receipts furnished by Notaries and Justices of the Peace will not be allowed in the future, according to instructions recently issued by State Board of fish and game Commissioners. Deputies all over the state have been told to arrest any hunter or fisherman who fails to show a fishing or hunting license in his possession, upon demand. The holder of a receipt will be treated in every way the same as though he had never made application for a license.

The reason for this action is plain. In the past, Notaries and Justices of the Peace, who have authority to collect for licenses, issue a receipt and mail the money to the County Clerk, who in turn mails a license to the Notary or Justice, to be delivered to the applicant, have failed to do so, pocketing the money and advising the applicant that a receipt is equivalent to a license. To stop this petty grafting, Game Warden Finley insists that licenses, in the future, will be recognized as the only evidence of a right to hunt or fish.

"We have a fairly complete record of notaries and justices who have retained money belonging to the game fund," said Warden Finley, "and they are located all over the state. These men have actually accepted money for licenses and made no return of it, nor have they secured licenses for those who have made application. By arresting those holding merely receipts for licenses, we will shortly run down those who have been guilty of this fraud."

It is provided by law that any Justice of the Peace or Notary in the State may receive money for the County Clerk on application for hunting or fishing licenses, and the Game Warden has no disposition to place an obstacle in the way of hunters to thus easily secure their rights. He is firm, however, in his intention to break up a practice which has proven demoralizing to many public and semi-public officials in all parts of Oregon.

SUNDAY SERMON PAUL'S ADVICE

Let us not therefore judge one another any more: but judge this rather, that no man put a stumbling block or an occasion to fall in his brother's way. Romans xiv, 13.

These words of Paul, the apostle, are but an excerpt from his philosophical and valuable discourse to the Romans, in one of his letters to them, in the charitable and judicious of one man concerning another and its reprehensible tendencies. They contain the good suggestion that every man should lend a hand of help to his neighbor in all things.

Far too many people are living in the world today, who, in their zealous rush and hurry to make what they consider a great personal success in life, are too prone to pay little heed to the welfare, yes, even to the rights of their brethren. Sometimes through thoughtlessness, but more often through real design, they place stumbling blocks of all kinds in the pathways that others must tread. Their slogan is of the "me and mine" variety regardless of what may happen to the other fellow.

Many of the victories of life in its pursuits are won through just such methods as these, but they are far from being desirable ones notwithstanding their material features. They are bound to carry with them uneasy consciences. For, say what you will, there are always moments in the life of everyone, particularly among those who are looked upon as having been most successful, when reflection is sure to make. Better Fruit Goes Far.

Birth Statistics for July and August.
The birth statistics, taken from the books of Dr. M. F. Shaw, county health officer, and Dr. Malcolm Brown, city health officer, show that thirty one children were born in the county of Hood River during the months of July and August. The sexes were almost equally divided for the two months, the books showing 16 male children and 15 girls. Births in the city numbered 15.

The birth rate for the two months was almost two thirds that of the death rate. The county during the time had 11 deaths, six of which were in the city.

PETITION CIRCULATED FOR EXTRA SESSION

Recommending that the majority report of the committee, recently appointed by Gov. West, and which met last week in Portland, when they advised that an extra session of the legislature be called to enact good road laws for the state, be acted upon and that the legislators be called together to consider highway bills, a petition is being broadly circulated in this county. The petition, which follows, is being almost unanimously signed by the citizens of the city and valley:

To the Hon. Oswald West, Governor of the State of Oregon.
Greeting: We, the undersigned citizens and taxpayers of Hood River County, State of Oregon, realizing that the development of our county and the entire state is now being retarded by the lack of suitable laws providing for the improvement of the public highway and being very desirous of seeing early action to put into effect the county bonding act and the general highway legislation recommended by the majority of the roads committee appointed by your honor and which said committee has now submitted its report to you, would respectfully petition you to call at once, and wish hereby to urge the importance of, an extra session of the state legislature for the sole purpose of speedily enacting the legislation proposed by the majority report of your committee.

Hood River Orchardist in The Dalles Corporation.

F. W. Settlemier, of Woodburn, Ore., J. D. Kiggs, of The Dalles and J. C. Dismore, proprietor of the Lingering orchard in Hood River valley, have incorporated a company and taken over the Fairbanks ranch on Ten Mile Creek which was purchased several years ago by Settlemier & Kiggs from D. J. Cooper of The Dalles. The new corporation will at once commence the planting of fruit trees, berries and ornamental trees and the entire tract will be cut up into small farms and placed upon the market. The plan of the company include the establishment of a townsite and a number of other improvements will be made as soon the population will warrant. A school is now located on the property and mail is delivered to the door of the ranches.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Pioneer Woman Dies in California.

Mrs. Anna Pentland Brooks, a pioneer woman of the state of Oregon, died Monday, September 11, in Pasadena, California. She was 82 years of age. She came to the west in 1850 by way of the isthmus of Panama together with her mother, joined the father, Robert Pentland, who had settled a number of years earlier at Oregon City. They later moved to The Dalles, where in August, 1872, the deceased was married to Robert L. Brooks. The journey to California was made last May, in hopes that the change of climate would benefit Mrs. Brooks health.

The Line Shaft and Governor of the Body.
