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PRAISE TO WIVES WHO ARE HELPMATES

Without the aid, co-operation and encouragement of his wife a man is seriously handicapped. Although it is unusual for the world to know of the facts the success of most men is due in great respect to their wives. The following article, a recent editorial in the Oregonian in praise of good womanhood, will bear reprinting.

In these trying times of prosperity we see many articles published telling how the writers achieved success in this Oregon country, and principally on small pieces of land. Such stories are highly inspiring, particularly to the young men and young women who are just starting out for themselves. They ought to do a world of good, not only to those who follow the footsteps of the successful ones, but to the state at large.

If one will take the trouble to tabulate and analyze these stories it will be discovered that in nine cases out of ten a good woman was the actual cause of the success. The same has been true since the world began, we suppose. It certainly has been the rule that the good helpmate has done more for man than any other one cause, since our forefathers landed on the bleak New England shore. There are, perhaps, fewer exceptions to the rule now than ever, particularly among those who have risen from poverty to affluence on the land.

We must give the wives of nearly all successful men great credit. In many cases they have suffered more hardships than their husbands, fathers or brothers, have labored harder, have worked far longer hours. No credit is too great for them.

But how often is the other side of the story alluded to? Where can we find stories of the wives who were not helpmates, but rather stumbling blocks to their husbands? How about the wives who almost from the day of marriage were begging for divorces, luxuries and unnecessary articles beyond their means? Do we read of them?

This is not a pleasing subject to touch upon; but many of us can point to cases where the extravagance of the wife has kept the husband in poverty, or at least his nose to the wheel, grinding his life out inch by inch. Would it not be well to take up this phase of life and now and then speak of the failures? Why not call attention to the women who have helped their husbands to success, and the money from her young husband for the purchase of a new dress, which she does not need, or a new hat, which all know to be above her means, when the same money put into a cow or two would mean success.

In telling about the cheery and encouraging words of the true helpmate, why not give a little thought to the poor husband who has had the very soul and spirit nagged out of him by a woman who did not know what she wanted, but was bound to have, if nagging could get them, many of the finer rich neighbors had?

Few such stories are published for the reason that the husbands are failures, or so considered, and no man likes to exploit himself as a failure. But would it not be well for some of the unfortunate ones to tell their stories for the benefit of the young wives who, with their husbands, are just starting out on the road of married life? All praise to the good women, the good wives, the self-sacrificing and noble mothers; but let us now and then have a word for the unfortunate husbands of the other sort of women.

A Garden of Allah.

Where the hot winds of the Sahara meet the verdure of the oasis the Arab pitches his tent under the palm trees by a limpid fountain and laying down his prayer rug he turns his face to the East and thanks Allah for bringing him to pleasant places where he and his camels may rest.

Did you know that the date palms which give the Arab bread and meat and sweetmeats, which furnish him literally with the staff of life, are grown in Southern California and that they will be shown at the San Diego Exposition bearing great clusters of ripening dates?

For ten years the United States Department of Agriculture has been experimenting with dates in Arizona and Southern California. It has had brought from Egypt, Arabia, from the Sudan, and from everywhere that the date grows, the finest kinds of date palms to be found in those countries, and its scientists have patiently cultivated these date palms and have experimented in the ways to produce the best fruit. Last year one date palm in the Coachella Valley yielded 100 pounds of dates which sold in Los Angeles at 80 cents per pound. Fifty date palms are set to the acre, so that there is promise of good profit in raising dates.

The American Date Company expects to have an acre of date palms in bearing at the Exposition in 1915, although the climate of San Diego is not so hot as the date best loves.

Chicago Markets Filled With Rabbits.

If Chicagoans cannot afford turkey for Christmas they can at least afford rabbit according to reports from trade journal of that city. The produce news says:

Rabbits are more plentiful this season than ever before, and the market is overstocked and demoralized. Friday (the 16th) records were the largest on record, amounting to over 100,000 carcasses, which caused prices to take a sudden drop. Advises from the surrounding country indicate that there are more rabbits this year than for a number of years past, and on account of the large number of men and boys who took advantage of the Thanksgiving holiday there was an over supply on Friday and Saturday.
