MRS. KAUFFMAN WRITES OF LOCAL BIRDS

The story below, written by Mrs. Rebecca Kauffman, recently appeared in "My Way," a publication of the Audubon Society.

One finds ardent bird lovers everywhere. One morning I stopped with a friend in Hood River where there was a well kept lawn and garden full of roses, other plants, trees and vines. Desiring information about a blue elder tree, covered with showy panicles of ripe fruit, I asked about them and learned that they were edible. The mistress of the place said she allowed the berries to remain on for the birds in winter, when it sometimes gets pretty cold here. She also told me that she buys seed in winter, shops it up and puts it at the base of the tree for the birds that stay and come down from Alaska—just as we are doing at home in Illinois! Perhaps a list of the birds, land and water, which we have seen more or less of, would be of interest. We have not made any special "nature trips" but have just our eyes and ears wide open to everything as we have gone along in our travels. I have enjoyed verifying my bird lists in the Portland Public Library, where I find most interesting books on birds by W. L. Finley, who is entirely familiar with Oregon and the Northwest.

ELK HERD SECURED BY GAME WARDEN

Through the efforts of State Game Warden William L. Finley, on his recent trip to Washington, D. C., the government has been persuaded to donate fifteen elk to the State of Oregon. These animals will be taken from the forest reserves of Wyoming, crated and transported to Oregon as soon as the people of this state provide an adequate pasture for them. They will become the sole property of Oregon and serve to perpetuate a race of noble animals that is rapidly becoming extinct.

In the northwestern part of the state there is a 2500 acre pasture that has been set aside by the national government for testing the utility of a coyote proof fence. It is said to have proven effective for that purpose and the forestry service, according to Warden Finley, is willing to give this big park to the state as an elk reserve. The matter of location, however, has not been settled, as this is a question that will be left largely to the state at large, as it is distinctly a matter of public interest.

The Wyoming elk are magnificent specimens and it is believed that they will thrive in this state. Fortunately, the Biological Survey of the Department of Agriculture will meet part of the expenses of crating and transporting the antlered herd from Wyoming to this state. The food for the winter will have to be provided by people of Oregon. It is expected they will be moved by February and some definite action as to location must be taken before that time.

Several other states have tried to secure these elk in the past, and Oregon ought to feel proud at having been successful in interesting the government in its decision to honor Oregon in the gift of these 15 animals, there ought soon to be quite a respectable herd. It is absolutely necessary that public sentiment be aroused in this behalf, as it is a matter that can be brought about by method. It is believed that the people will stand behind Warden Finley in this effort, as he has given his word that Oregon will find a place to house these animals if the Government would give them.

Tips Buy Fur Coat.

One thousand dimes, all 10-cent pieces, tips received during a period covering two years, were paid last week by Miss Ivy Cole, a waitress in a Denver, Colo., cafe, for a fur coat. "It took me just two years to get these dimes," said Miss Cole. "Two years ago, Thanksgiving, I decided to save the tips I received in dimes until I got \$100, and then buy a fur coat. It isn't so easy as it sounds, either. 'I've been spending an hour every day looking in the different shop windows for the coat that would satisfy me. I wanted to get it for Thanksgiving, but I was \$2 short and had determined to get a \$100 coat.'

Hoyt Will Raise Fibers.

C. D. Hoyt, whose place is near Summit, will put out a small number of fiber trees next year. He has a number of English walnuts on his place the age of which is five years. They bore nicely last fall. Philip Kollas, also of the Summit region has walnut trees twelve years of age, which bear heavily.

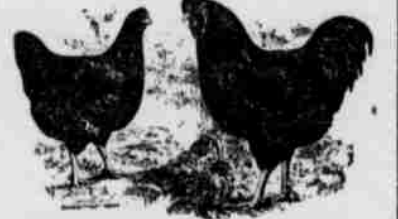
