**MANY MENTIONED FOR COUNTY JUDGE**

More than half a dozen of the citizens of the city have been solicited by friends to put in their applications for the office of county judge to take the place of Judge Geo. O. Culbertson, who has tendered his resignation to Governor Oswald West. W. L. Clark, M. M. Hill, Leslie Butler, C. R. Bone, Lawrence N. Blowers, W. E. King and S. F. Blythe have all been mentioned as appointees for the position. However, with the exception of Mr. Clark all have signified their unwillingness to accept the office.  
 No one in the county is perhaps better acquainted with the needs than is Mr. Clark, who has been one of the road viewers for a number of years. He has a strong support and a petition, signed by many of the leading citizens has been forwarded to Governor West. Mr. Clark is a civil engineer and for a

**number of years was in charge of government work at Cascade Locks.**

Judge Culbertson gave as his reason for the resignation impossibility to attend the duties of the office, and lack of adequate remuneration.
