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

## AVOID BABY TALK SAYS PROFESSOR

That baby talk is as bad as the colic was one of the startling ways in which Dr. A. A. Berle, professor of Applied Christianity at Tufts college, Cambridge, drove home the facts he was giving in his lectures on "Education" at the University of Oregon the past two weeks. He explained that colic, if allowed to continue, would develop into chronic dyspepsia and "baby talk," if not corrected, would become a fixed habit with the child that would be a constant source of possible embarrassment in later life.

Dr. Berle's principal plea was for more intensive education of children, to the end that the greatest amount of knowledge might be acquired during the early plastic years of a child's life, leaving the later years for accomplishment in the realms of original research.

Dr. Berle would have children in the fifth and sixth grades taught at least German in addition to English, claiming that children of that age can most easily acquire a new language. He would, too, avoid the use of "simplified" textbooks that do not use the ordinary terminology of a science. A child can learn the proper technical name for an object just as easily as a modified name, and he does not have to unlearn anything when he comes to advanced work. Many of Dr. Berle's doctrines are revolutionary in a measure, but they have served to set to thinking on the educational problem, the many students who are attending the university summer school from all parts of the state.

Dr. Berle's elder son entered Harvard at the age of 15 years and distinguished himself in the activities of the school.

## METHOD OF MAKING UNCOOKED JAMS

That natural fruit jams are far superior to cooked jams is the opinion of Prof. C. I. Lewis of the U. S. C. department of horticulture. He describes his method of preparing them as follows:

"Such fruits as raspberries and black raspberries and strawberries make most delicious uncooked jam, and one can enjoy a very palatable shortcake in the middle of the winter very small expense. To prepare this jam, be sure first that your berries are sound. Throw out all soft, mouldy or in any way decayed fruit. This is imperative. Then mix equal amounts of sugar and fruit, and crush the whole mixture carefully. Be sure that no berries are left whole.

"Before putting into jars some people stir the fruit occasionally for several days to insure that the sugar and fruit are thoroughly mixed. After the fruit and sugar are so mixed, put them into fruit jars but do not seal them. The only covering that should be given them is a little paper to keep out dust. If the jars are sealed the chances are that the fruit will spoil; but if left unsealed, it can be kept for some time. I have kept it for two years.

"Red and white currants treated in this way make a delicious jam. This is somewhat different from that known as sun-dried jam. The sun-dried jam is cooked somewhat. In the natural jam the flavor of the fruit is preserved."

## OUTSIDE CITIES HELP PORTLAND ENTERTAIN
