WELCH PURCHASES REACH \$89,500

During the past 90 days A. Welch, well known throughout the state because of his interest in electrical and traction propositions, has purchased property in the valley to the amount of \$89,500. The last purchase of Mr. Welch was that of the Chas. H. Henney ranch in the Belmont district, the agency of G. Y. Edwards & Co., Mr. Welch paying the sum of \$13,500 for the ten acres, a half of which is in seven, eight and nine year old trees and the remainder in three and four year old trees of standard varieties. A handsome bungalow home is erected on the place.

Mr. Welch also purchased last week the eight acre ranch of John Ricard in the Belmont district, paying the sum of \$13,500 for this tract also. The place is better known as the Clapp place, having been disposed of by him when he traded for the Jackson block in this city.

Mr. Welch's first purchases were in the Harrett district, he having purchased land to the value of \$50,000 there from Devlin & Firebaugh. The purchase of the place of Lou Wheeler for \$12,500 brings the total to the sum of \$89,500.

Mr. Welch declares that he does not intend to come and make a summer home on any of the places, but that he bought the land for investment and speculative purposes.

Butler Receives Phasants

Leslie Butler received last Saturday from Glen Simpson, who conducts the state China pheasant farm at Corvallis, two dozen of the handsome birds, which were released on the Butler ranch on the West Side Sunday by Howard Peeler. Mr. Butler's place, that of Mr. Peeler and a number of other places on both sides of the river have been made game preserves. Mr. Peeler has been appointed a special deputy game warden and any one molesting China pheasants will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. Not only fine attaches, but one guilty of killing pheasants until 1915, when the season will open, may be imprisoned.

There are many of the handsome fowls, partly domesticated, now in the Hood River valley and with proper protection by the time people are allowed to hunt them, the community should be well stocked.

The numbers of silver gray squirrels that have become so tame as to come to back doors of homes for food are noticeable in Hood River. Dr. J. F. Watt has some of the little rodents as pets, and they present a beautiful picture as they play on the lawns or among the handsome Hood River oaks.

Last week one of the little fellows entered the kitchen and came into the dining room of the home of Carl H. Vaughan. Although an unwitting guest the family was glad to have so novel a visitor to entertain.

The boys of the city should not thoughtlessly harm the little animals; for they will increase in numbers and be a source of great pleasure to old and young in time to come.

Nitric Acid Destroys Stump

An Australian farmer has discovered a method of destroying stumps. He bores a two-inch auger hole and pours nitric acid, followed by sulphuric acid. This treatment rots the stump so completely in five weeks that it can be knocked to pieces with a hoe. About half a pint of each acid suffices for a three-foot stump.
