ELECTRIC RUMORS DENIED BY DANFORTH

The rumors that have been circulated to the effect that the Pacific Power & Light Co. had secured control of the local lighting field and had got control of the Hydro-Electric Co. have been emphatically denied by R. S. Danforth, the new manager of the Hydro-Electric Co. "On the face of it the rumors are without any foundation," says Mr. Danforth.
