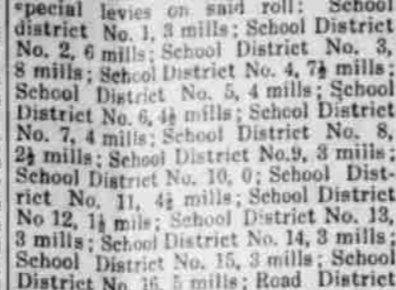
In the matter of the petition of J. E. Ferguson and others for the organization of an irrigation district. It appearing to the court that in pursuance to an order previously made by his court ordering an election to be held on the 14th of January, 1913, for the purpose of determining whether an irrigation district should be created, and that this 20th day of January, 1913, is the day provided by law for the county court to canvass the vote at said election. And from the canvass of such vote it appears that more than the required three-fifths vote are "Irrigation District-Yes," namely, 166 votes in favor of creating said district and 36 votes against it. It is therefore ordered that said district has been duly organized, and that it shall be known under the name and name of "East Fork Irrigation District."

And it further appearing from the canvass of the votes cast for the various officers for said district that the following named persons received the highest number of votes for the offices named below, and are hereby declared elected:  
Assessor, R. H. Waugh; collector, J. M. Taylor; treasurer, Truman Butler; director division number 1, C. R. Bone; director number 2, J. A. Moore; director number 3, J. E. Ferguson; director division number 4, C. Dethman; director division number 5, E. Hawkes.

The voters' report on the proposed road petitioned for by A. O. Adams and others was read the first and second time in open court and ordered passed such readings.  
It appearing to the court that there are not sufficient funds on hand to cash warrants, the clerk is instructed to draw warrants in denominations of \$1,000 and deliver same to treasurer when he shall call for them. Such warrants shall not exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$8,000, and such warrants are to be registered for the purpose of obtaining funds to cash smaller warrants issued to meet current expenses.
