## Local Men Will Attend Conference

## County Will Oil Roads

The board of county commissioners signed a contract Monday night with the Portland Road Oiling Co., for the oiling of the macadam roads of the county. The price to be charged for the work is \$185 per mile. The length of road to be oiled is about seven and a half miles. Eighty barrels of oil will be used to the mile. ## Station Office to be Opened Saturday

The office of the experimental station will be opened here in the Blairton building Saturday, when C. C. Starring, who is studying the problems of irrigation and cover crops, and A. L. Lovett, who will take up the entomological work, will be ready to meet the orchardists of the district and talk over the problems that confront them. Mr. Lovett, who is a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, has been at the Oregon Agricultural College for the past two years. He has been studying field crop insects there.

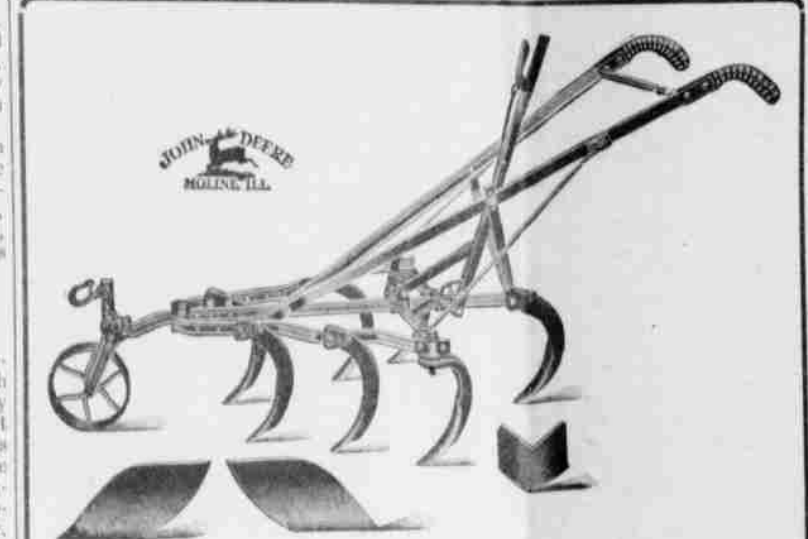

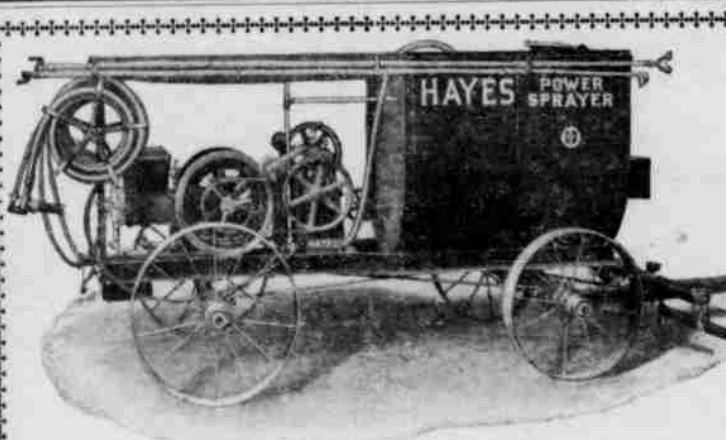
