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MAKE MOUNT HOOD PARK, SAYS VISITOR

Professor C. S. Sargent, of Massachusetts, considered the world's greatest authority on trees and a leader second only to Gifford Pinchot in the conservation movement, was in Portland last week. He was accompanied by Judge Charles Stratton, former president of the Boston park board, and Byard Thayer, of Lancaster, Mass.

Professor Sargent prefers that his address be given as Arboretum, Mass., for it is here that he is the directing head of the greatest collection of trees and shrubs in the United States. It is not in the world. This is Harvard University's "tree school."

Professor Sargent came to Oregon on what would probably be considered an eccentric mission. The Picea Breweriana, or weeping spruce, which is native to southern Oregon, is just now at its best. He desires to see it and came across the country with his friends, for the purpose of gathering specimens of the tree and endeavor to transplant them in the Arboretum. There is one specimen in the city park which is alive, but which is not growing very well.

"There can be no adequate reason why Mount Hood should not formally be made into a national park," said Professor Sargent. "This should be done now before the forests are taken away. The lumber value of the trees on the slopes of Mount Hood is nothing compared to its value as a park asset. The people of Oregon will always be sorry if they do not insist that Mount Hood be made into a national park with roads about its base that will permit access to the scenic wonders that I am informed exist there."

"Another thing that Oregon should have is a completely equipped arboretum. This should be under the direction of some university and not under a political organization. Growing conditions here are infinitely superior to what we have in Massachusetts. You could have specimens of almost every plant or tree."

Ohio Apples Scarce
(From the Marion Ohio, Daily Star)
No article on the market is causing dealers generally more trouble than apples. The crop this year is very small generally, but Delaware is considered fortunate because surrounding the city are a few orchards, all too few at best, where some good apples were employed to combat the late frosts. From these there is a small crop, the earliest of which, it is stated, will be exhausted this week.

Under the new laws, the product must be sold by the pound, and the retail price is now four pounds for 25 cents. Figure at the old bushel rate, this makes the price 75 cents a peck or three dollars a bushel, a price not met before for apples except much more out of season than now. Local dealers do not hold out a cheering prospect for very much better prices in the later apples, and there is every indication that many an apple lover will have to content himself either with a flat pocketbook or a lessened satisfaction this fall.

Even with this the apples that are being offered are but a second or third grade. Some orchard, which ordinarily produce hundreds of bushels, will not have even the first multiple of that amount for sale this year.

THE FORTY-SEVENTH G. A. R. ENCAMPMENT

For many years there has been a growing sentiment among the Federal survivors that they should as an organization make one more pilgrimage to the Chattanooga battlefields, and live over again the scenes of 1862. By a happy coincidence, the invitation extended and accepted for the 1913 encampment, so that it marks the semi-centennial of the celebrated battle of Mission Ridge, Lookout Mountain and "Blood Chockamunga."

In view of this enormous influx of visitors it is well to point out Chattanooga's preparedness. The executive committee of the Chattanooga Encampment Association is composed in large part of the leaders who served in similar capacity in May. The records, properties, employees and experience are all carried forward into the new organization, thus assuring that blunders due to inexperience will be avoided. The Confederate reunion welded the public spirited people of this city together in one enthusiastic unit capable of doing things in an even better, bigger and braver way.

No veteran or other visitor need doubt the city's cordiality or ability. Chattanooga has a whole-souled determination to make the first G. A. R. encampment held in the real south epochal in respect to attendance and enjoyment.

Unusually low railroad rates will be in effect for the encampment, probably over all lines, and certainly over a great many. The encampment, together with the constant attractions which exist in and around Chattanooga, should attract a number of local visitors to this city not directly connected with the party particularly interested in the event itself. Chattanooga—speaking of the entire community—is a smiling, growing city of about 100,000 people.

S. F. Blythe, of the Canby Corps, G. A. R., has received a communication from Chattanooga relative to the encampment, and a number of local men are very much interested in the southern meeting. It is probable that a number of local men will attend the encampment.
