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## LOCAL U. STUDENTS SEND RESOLUTIONS

The seven local students, who are attending the University of Oregon, have signed a resolution urging the local citizens to register, appear at coming November 4 elections and defeat the referendum against the appropriations made by the last legislature. Fifty-five eastern Oregon students have signed similar resolutions. Lyman G. Rice was chairman of the meeting called for the action taken, and Miss Eva Brock was secretary. The resolution is given below.

The eastern Oregon students at the University of Oregon take this means of expressing their regret that extensions of the University's facilities has been delayed by the referendum.

We are in daily contact with conditions at the University and realize how difficult it is becoming to handle the fast increasing student body without a corresponding increase in facilities.

The University has had no new building for seven years, and the last structure erected was a library. The appropriations under the referendum call for \$100,000 for a new administration and class room building and \$75,000 to make extensions and repairs to four other buildings. We know this added room is greatly needed, and since the last new building was put up.

Deady Hall and Villard Hall, the principal class room buildings now, were built in 1876 and 1885, respectively.

Pride in our state University and a desire to see it helped rather than hindered in becoming the great institution it is destined to be, has prompted us, in convention this day assembled, to agree as follows:

Resolved, that we urge all the people of our respective communities to register without fail and to support the University on November 4, in the two matters that are so vital to its continued progress, and

Resolved, that we view with sorrow and apprehension the misuse of the referendum against the just cause of higher education by individuals whom we believe to be actuated by motives of private and personal malice, and by others who are well disposed but who have been misled and misinformed.

## KNIGHTS PREPARE FOR NEXT GRAND LODGE

During the session of the Grand Lodge of the Knights of Pythias of Oregon in Portland, next month, members of the order will have the opportunity to see the Bible which Justus H. Rathbone, founder of the order used in obligating its first members half a century ago. This historic relic, which is dear to the hearts of the 800,000 members of this fraternity, has never been shown before west of the Rocky mountains, so the privilege the Oregon Knights will enjoy is a distinguished one.

Fred E. Wheaton of Minneapolis, Minn., Supreme Keeper of Record and Seal of the Supreme Lodge of the Knights of Pythias will be present at the coming session of the Grand Lodge and he will bring this Bible with him.

This Bible, which was given to the founder of the order by his mother on his fifth birthday, October 29, 1844, was used by him in obligating the first members of the Knights of Pythias. It was also used by him in instituting the first lodge of the order, Washington Lodge No. 1, in the national capital on February 19, 1864.

During the session of the Grand Lodge the historic Bible will be used in the initiation of a large class into the first rank of the order and those who take the first step in Pythianism at that time will be obligated on this Bible. This Bible has been used in the initiation of almost 6000 members of the order but it has never been heretofore west of the state of Kansas.

Members from all parts of the state will form the class which will be initiated at the Grand Lodge this year and from present indications almost every lodge in the state will take to Portland at least one candidate for this initiation which will rank as the most historic event of the kind in the history of Pythianism in Oregon.

This feature of the coming Grand Lodge session will make this convention the most noteworthy ever held in the state and it will probably be marked by a larger attendance than that of any previous session of the Grand Lodge. The Grand Lodge will convene on October 14 and this will be the thirty-second annual session.

Another feature which will make the coming session of the Grand Lodge a notable one is that steps will be taken toward the securing of the session of the Supreme Lodge for Portland in 1916. It is believed the Grand Lodge will consent to come to Portland that year and plans for securing his gathering which will bring to Portland prominent men from all parts of the United States and Canada will be discussed. At the Grand Lodge session last year a committee composed of prominent Pythians from all parts of the state was appointed to consider this matter and this committee will report at the coming session. This committee consists of L. M. Curl of Albany; William M. Calkins of Portland; Gus C. Moser, Portland; L. R. Stinson, Salem; J. W. Maloney, Pendleton; M. F. Davis, Union; W. L. Salsburg, Yreka; J. H. Gwinn, Pendleton; L. E. Crouch, Portland; Walter G. Gleason Baker, Clark; E. Saunders, Medford; Fred J. Johnson, Astoria; Frank T. Wrightman, Salem; George R. Marshallfield, and H. L. Poorman, Ontario.
