UNIVERSITY OFFERS AID TO PEOPLE
November 19, 1913.
Editor Glacier: In order to assist and serve the communities of the state in their expanding and developing life, the University of Oregon has established a department which has for its purpose the accumulation of information on topics which concern the general welfare and the distribution of this data by means of package libraries, and specially prepared reports, among interested communities.

Busy officials often do not have time to keep up with the latest developments in the fields of public accounting, city planning, government organization, such as the commission government or city management plan and the treatment of defective delinquent classes. This department plans to collect the results of the experience of other cities and communities throughout the country and make all this information available for those who wish to know what is the best thought on their respective problems.

More specifically, the department aims to do the following for the communities of Oregon:
1. To provide expert information on the problems which are arising in connection with municipal administration, as for example, the problems connected with street paving, park administration, police and fire protection, water supply systems, and questions connected with the operation or regulation of public utilities.

2. To assist and direct by correspondence and personal conferences, communities which desire social surveys made, either of all the activities of the community, or of any special phase of its life. Heretofore, men and women have been so conscious of the need of knowing the facts about their communities. All real constructive work must start with a fact basis.

3. To cooperate with boards of county commissioners, city officials, health officers, superintendents of work houses, county and state asylums, supervisors of the poor, so that the best information may be had in conducting the public business which may be placed at the disposal of every public official.

4. To cooperate with county and city treasurers and auditors, and other financial officials, and to give advice regarding the installation of up to date methods of controlling receipts and disbursements, and modern practices connected with auditing vouchers, purchasing supplies, and letting contracts.

5. To cooperate with voluntary societies such as commercial clubs, improvement associations, welfare leagues, health societies, women's clubs, etc., in working out plans for social betterment programs; and with county superintendents and county school boards with special reference to the finances of rural schools.

No more need of presenting ideas has been invented than the series of lectures to arouse interest and cooperation. Any municipality in the state that is interested in this method of presenting community needs should consult with the extension department of the University.
This department stands ready to tell you what has been done elsewhere and what may be done in your community. It wishes to be useful in the service of the communities of the state. Everywhere communities are becoming conscious of needs met, and of opportunities neglected. A new responsibility rests upon the community. It is not a question of whether our schools are as efficiently conducted or our streets as clean as in other cities, but it is a question of whether our schools and streets and city administration are the best we can have.

The extension department is peculiarly well fitted to cooperate with the towns of the state in this work, either by correspondence, lectures or personal conferences, as it now has upon its regular extension faculty Prof. D. C. Cowers, who has specialized along the lines of political and social science at Columbia University, New York, and has for some time been connected with the Training School for Public Service which is conducted by the Bureau of Municipal Research. Before coming to Oregon he had practical experience in various city departments of New York City and participated in the preparation of governmental officials in the preparation of the present budget which was voted on October 31, and carried appropriations amounting to nearly \$200,000,000. He is thus especially well fitted to give advice and suggestions dealing with the financial operations of cities, and to advise with local officials regarding the installation of up to date accounting systems and the modern methods of business procedure.

EXCHANGE SAYS GOOD MARKET IN GERMANY

The German apple market is now the most favorable for American apples and new record prices for Pacific northwest offerings are being made there almost daily. At Bremen the trade rather excited over the sales of some apples shipped from this section.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange has received a special cable telling of some of these extraordinary transfers. A carload of Peshastin Jonathans sold at an average of \$1.84 per box, f. o. b. for stock of extra fancy grade, but mixing it later. A carload of Cashmere stock, extra fancy and fancy assorted sold at an average of \$1.68 for both grades f. o. b. Cashmere.

The real big sale was the disposal of a carload of Rogue River Spitzenburgs. The car consisted of over half fancy and the remainder extra fancy. The latter averaged about \$2 a box at Rogue River while the former went at \$3.50, according to the Northwestern bulletin.

The entire German apple market is reported in a better condition, a fact fully substantiated by the sales mentioned.

A great block of local fruit has gone to German markets this year and news of a good market there is cheering to Hood River people.

DR. ELIOT PAYS TRIBUTE TO VALLEY

Dr. T. L. Eliot, pastor emeritus of the First Unitarian church of Portland, paid a great tribute to the Hood River valley last Thursday night, when he spoke the closing words of the North Pacific Unitarian conference, which had held its annual convention in the city.

"Hood River is one of my homes," said Dr. Eliot, "and I am glad that the autumn weather has been so fine during the convention. All of us have had a pleasant time at the convention, for the Hood River people have been hospitable and have opened their doors to us."

Dr. Eliot declared that there was no spot more blessed with river, sky and temperate weather than Hood River. At the banquet tendered the delegates at 6 p. m. Thursday, E. L. Smith, who has long been a leading member of the Unitarian church here, delivered an address.

Officers for the next year were elected as follows: S. C. Hamilton, of Salem, president; Edwin S. Start, of the University of Washington, Seattle, first vice pres.; Wm. P. Olda, Portland, second vice pres.; Rev. W. G. Eliot, Portland, corresponding sec.; Rev. H. A. Macdonald, of this city, recording secretary; Judge N. Day, of Bell Ingham, Wash., and Walter Matheson, Vancouver, B. C., directors.

The convention of next year will either be held in Salem or Seattle.

Eastman Apple New Variety

The Eastman apple, now being cultivated in the Upper Mississippi valley, was planted and developed for the peculiar needs of that region which is characterized by long, dry, cold winters. It has proved to be a remarkably early, regular and prolific bearer.

As the business aspects of fruit growing receive more definite recognition, varieties will be planted more to meet particular conditions, and for special rather than for general purposes, says the Agricultural Department year book in discussing some promising new fruits.

For instance, under present conditions one of the most important requirements of a winter apple in many sections is that it have good cold storage qualities. Summer apples were for a long period a minor commercial consideration, but for the past ten or fifteen years an important demand for them has developed in the eastern markets, which has greatly stimulated the planting of early apple varieties in sections where formerly they were little valued.
