GOLDEN WEDDING DAY IS OBSERVED

At their orchard home in the Belmont district, where they have resided since 1901, Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Butts, with a number of their close friends and neighbors as their guests, will today celebrate their fiftieth wedding anniversary. The wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Butts was solemnized on November 24, 1864, at Chicago, Napierville, Ill., was the birthplace of Mrs. Butts (Susanna Ditzler), daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth Ditzler. Mr. Butts, son of Amos and Esther Wenner Butts, was born at Allentown, Pa. He removed with his parents to Napierville in 1845. In 1865 Mr. and Mrs. Butts removed to Burlington, Wis., where Mr. Butts engaged in the produce business. He remained there until 1868, when he removed to Chicago to enter the commission produce business with his brother, O. W. Butts. Mr. Butts remained in Chicago, in the commission and real estate business, until 1901, when he came to Hood River, buying his orchard place. Mrs. Butts followed the next year. "I left Chicago," says Mr. Butts, "with a northeast blizzard blowing and in the midst of a fierce snowstorm. The weather the next day was better. It was clear and cold. By the time I reached Hood River the storm had passed. An Oregon mist was prevailing when I arrived in Hood River. As I stepped off the train I saw a gentleman standing on the curb log. There was no curb stone but a big log was placed at the street side of the station. The man was eyeing me. He was expecting my brother, O. W. Butts, and as I did not quite fit the description he allowed me to pass. "I went to the Mount Hood hotel, of which Mrs. Gilbert was then proprietor. The next day this same gentleman called at the hotel and inquired for me. I then found him to be the Hon. T. R. Coon. We had a short chat and took a stroll up the hill to the house, where I met Mrs. Coon and family. The following day we visited town and got acquainted with Capt. Blowers, Geo. Crowell, Mr. Jackson, Mr. Blythe, Mr. Savage and others. "A few days later Mr. Coon and I took a walk out to my brother's place. We found 20 acres cleared and in strawberries, 15 acres of it in cherry trees. A few years later took out the cherry trees and planted apple trees. In the next time I cleared the remainder of the place and put in berries and apple trees. Have now an orchard of 19 acres from three to five years old. "In 1902 bought 25 acres of T. R. Coon. The place was in what was known as Pole Flat, in the Oak Grove district. This was all in heavy timber. I cleared about ten acres and raised strawberries and apple trees. I have now seven acres in trees from three to six years old. In 1912 took a trip to Chicago and found many changes in the way of improvements. My wife and I enjoyed the trip, however, but in three months were glad to return to Hood River. "At today's festivities, while Mr. and Mrs. Butts, who have traveled life's path together so happily during the half century, are receiving the congratulations of their friends, Mrs. Butts will be dressed in the gown worn on the wedding day just 50 years ago last Tuesday.
