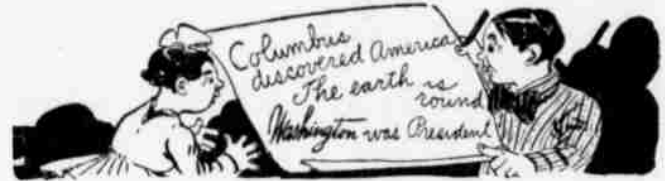

## E. H. SHEPARD BORN TO FRUIT BUSINESS

The fruit industry has been born and bred in E. H. Shepard, sole editor and publisher of Better Fruit, a monthly periodical devoted entirely to orcharding and allied businesses. Mr. Shepard is 58 years of age, having been born at Marysville, Calif., in 1857. His father, E. A. Shepard, was a pioneer orchardist of the Marysville district having planted the New England orchard, the seeds of which today demand a premium in the country's markets. The elder Shepard had been raised in an orchard district in New England, and had spent his boyhood in learning the methods of caring for trees.

E. H. Shepard was graduated from the University of California, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Philosophy, in 1880. He is a member of the Zeta Psi National Greek Letter Fraternity. Throughout his life he has been active in the alumni affairs of institutions of higher education. He is a member of the Portland University club and a charter member of the Hood River University club. Mr. Shepard, after leaving college, became engaged in the wholesale mercantile business. He removed to Portland in 1884, where he has been active in social life, having become a member of the Arlington club, in which organization he still retains his membership. In 1901 Mr. Shepard was married to Miss Alice Failing, a member of one of Portland's pioneer families.

Mr. Shepard came to Hood River in 1903 and purchased orchard tracts. At the present time he is owner of a 40 acre full bearing commercial orchard. He established Better Fruit in 1906. Mr. Shepard has been active in the development of marketing systems. For nine years he was on the board of the local cooperative shipping association, and for six years managed the organization. At the same time he has figured prominently in national fruit circles. He is a member of the International Apple Shippers Association. In 1910 he delivered an address before that body at the annual convention in Niagara Falls, N. Y. In 1911 Mr. Shepard delivered an address at Sacramento. Last year he addressed the meeting of the California Fruit Growers Association at Davis, Calif. For the past seven years Mr. Shepard has been invited to address the Washington State Horticultural Society at their annual conventions, and during that time he has missed but one meeting.

## SAM HEPPNER PLANS ALASKAN FRUIT SALES

Sam W. Heppner and son, Clayton Heppner, who left here Sunday afternoon for Juneau, Alaska, plan on spending the summer on the far north making a close study of conditions and hoping that they may find them such as to justify efforts to dispose of a portion of the Hood River fruit crop there.

"We shall remain in Alaska until fall, perhaps spring," said Mr. Heppner just before his departure. "We will visit all the important cities, and in case we find the demand for fruit of proper proportions we will buy lots and build storage cars."

"I have talked with a number of people about such a venture, and they all tell me that I look at it from a pretty level-headed stand point. I do not see why we cannot send a lot of our fruit up there. Juneau has the largest stamp mill in the world, and the payroll is such as to cause a man to take off his hat. I think we can sell a lot of our Hood River apples. I have already secured the backing of a number of growers, who tell me that if I meet with success I may sell their fruit."
