MAN HERE WHO SAW LINCOLN SHOT

One of the few surviving citizens of the country, who witnessed the assassination of President Lincoln, W. H. Hershey, of Dayton, Ind., father of A. O. Hershey, of Clatskanie and formerly of this city, accompanied by his sister, Mrs. Anna Whistler, of Heath, Ind., is here visiting the families of his old friends, Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Bartmess and Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Waugh.

"The incident of that terrible night are still vivid in my mind," says Mr. Hershey. "In my imagination I can still see Abraham Lincoln, with his long strides, as he passed into the theatre to the box. I remember how tall he looked, and how funny it looked to see Mrs. Lincoln, tiny as she was, hurrying along behind him. He looked so young. The play stopped as the party was visible at the back of the theatre. The orchestra played 'Hail to the Chief,' and then 'Yankee Doodle.' When the members of the party were seated the play went on.

"Our American Cousin, was the play we had gone to see, two comrades and I. I have forgotten the names of those boys who were with me. Through me on a sudden impulse had decided to see the show that night. Harry Hawk was playing the leading part, being the American. Miss Laura Keane was the English cousin. She was accompanied by an old aunt, and I remember how we laughed at the stage scenes, when Hawk, with the exuberance of American youth, grasped his cousin and kissed her. The old lady was astonished at such action.

"I remember how the presidential party was sitting. Mrs. Lincoln went in first. She was followed by a young woman relative. Then came Major Rathborn and the president, the location of whom was favorable to Booth.

"A little while before the shot was fired, I remember looking over toward the president's box and seeing someone standing against the door. He looked as though he might have been peering through, and it is said that Booth, who had access to the theatre, had cut a hole in the box with his pen knife. I believe he was getting the exact location of the president; for after he entered the box he knew he would have to act quickly.

"Hawk and the old aunt had been having a war of words on the stage and had backed off into the wings, one on each side, when the shot was fired. For some time we all thought it was a part of the play. Then we saw Booth as he started to jump over the railing to the stage. As he was springing down with a dirk in his left hand Major Rathborn reached for him. He was below the level of the box railing. Booth slashed the hand of the officer, and his body with a kind of swing, fell into the floor. And it was then, I think, that he injured his limb. The derringer with which the president had been shot, had dropped in the box.

"Booth's leg, I think, was not broken, as he has been said. He ran across the stage, and when in about the center shrieked out, 'Sic semper tyrannis.' I shall never forget how that made me feel. Miss Keane then appeared on the stage and with her hand to her head cried out: 'Oh, the president has been assassinated.'

"In a few moments everybody was trying to get out of the theatre. As I reached the stairs six men, bearing the president on a stretcher, came by. They were escorted by six guards, who were forced to push the people out of the way with the butts of their guns. I had to put up my hands several times to keep from being struck in the face with the guns. I was willing enough to stop, but the people behind were shoving so that I was pressed right up against the guards.

"The president was carried across the street from the theatre to a little frame building, and it was there that he died the next morning about eight o'clock.

"My two comrades and I hastened to our place of encampment on Arlington Heights. We had no more than crossed the wooden bridge than an orderly dashed up and told the guard not to allow anybody to pass out of the city. Several other members of our company who had seen the assassination were prevented from coming back to camp until the next day."
