His latest success occurred last week, when he was commissioned to construct the first doubled in the propeller type of ferry hoat driven wor. struct similar crart. His latest score occurred last week, when he was com-missioned to construct the first double-end propeller type of ferry boat, driven by a Diesel oil burning engine, ever

by a Diesel oil burning engine, ever built in the world.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer in speaking of the proposed boat says:

"The King county board of commissioners has authorized Capt. Otis Treiber to prepare plans and specifications for a new ferryboat to ply between Seattle and Vashon Island. The ferry will be of the double-end propeltween Seattle and Vashon Island. The ferry will be of the double-end propeller type, operated by Diesel oil burning engines, and its dimensions over all will be 120 feet in length, 36 feet beam, 13 feet high, with an 8 foot draft, and will have a total capacity of 600 passengers, 275 of whom may be seated inside the boat, with a deck capacity sufficient for 33 automobiles. The estimated cost of the boat is \$30,000, and its speed at 12 miles an hour.

"Four men will be required to operate the vessel, and Chairman M. J. Carrigan expressed the belief that because of the efficiency that will be provided by the boat itself and all of its equipment it will be operated at so low
