### CAPT. OTIS TREIBER IS MAKING GOOD

Capt. Otis Treiber is another Hood River boy who is making good. Because of the success of a boat built by himself for the Underwood-Hood River ferry system, recently sold to Bert Kent, he was called by county officials of the Puget Sound district to construct similar craft. His latest success occurred last week when he was commissioned to construct the first double-end propeller type of ferry boat, driven by a Diesel oil burning engine, ever built in the world.

The Post-Intelligencer in speaking of the proposed boat says: "The King county board of commissioners has authorized Capt. Otis Treiber to prepare plans and specifications for a new ferryboat to ply between Seattle and Vashon Island. The ferry will be of the double-end propeller type, operated by Diesel oil burning engines, and its dimensions over all will be 120 feet in length, 36 feet beam, 13 feet high, with an 80-horse power draft, and will have a total capacity of 600 passengers, 275 of whom may be seated inside the boat, with a deck capacity sufficient for 33 automobiles. The estimated cost of the boat is \$20,000, and it is expected to be ready in four months."

"Four men will be required to operate the vessel, and Chairman M. J. Carrigan expressed the belief that because of the efficiency that will be provided by the boat itself and all of its equipment it will be operated at so low a cost that it will be a paying utility from the first trip it makes to Vashon Island."

Mrs. Treiber and children will return to the Sound district with Capt. Treiber, who was here the latter part of last week.

### COURT PLEASUED WITH EXPERIMENTAL ROAD

The county court has expressed satisfaction with the two miles of West Side macadam just south of Columbia park, which were resurfaced in the early summer by Roy D. Smith, supervisor of the district, with clay and gravel.

"I have ridden over the road in an automobile," says Judge Stanton, "and it is like riding over a paved street. It is very likely that we will use more of a similar surfacing on the old macadam."

The surface of the road, applied at a comparatively small expense, results, after the top dressing has packed, the clay binding the gravel, in every respect similar to the Belmont road.

### HOOD RIVER CHERRIES WIN LAURELS

According to a letter received by Willmer Sling from C. N. Ravin, cherries sent by J. R. Nunamaker to the Panama-Pacific exposition have won laurels. The Lamberts were the finest submitted to the jury of awards, and a plate of the fruit was taken by the government for an oil painting. The Bings made an especial appeal to the jury because of the decidedly high flavor.

Mr. Ravin says, however, that Oregon growers, case learn a few tricks from the growers of California, who pack their fruit more attractively. California cherries are packed so there is no possibility of a cherry being cut. They are rounded out in a bulging similar to that used in packing apples.

An Oregon Commission bulletin says: "The Willamette and Rogue River valley sent quantities of cherries, and some of them wondrous, but Hood River sent the box of the largest cherries shown at the exposition. These were Lamberts and of a size unbelievable to those unfamiliar with the size to which Oregon cherries grown. Hood River has a right to make a big noise."
