ORGANIZE PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION

From the Mosier Bulletin

Sunday afternoon the Mosier Fish and Game Protective association was organized with 15 members, W. O. Hadley, deputy game warden, Prof. Bergfeldt, president of the Rod and Gun club at The Dalles, C. Moore and Mr. Hucker, directors of the association at The Dalles, and D. McDonald, representing the Hood River association were present and gave good talks.

It was decided to incorporate and ally with the Oregon Sportmen's league which is an amalgamation of all such clubs in Oregon. The dues will be \$1 per year to defray the running expenses. By-laws will be copied from The Dalles association, whose members offered their services free.

The object of this association is to protect the fish and birds and keep sportsmenlike people from poisoning out of season; to introduce new game birds and to see that violation of the game laws are stopped. Each member will constitute a special deputy to report all such cases. J. E. Cole, who was made chairman of the meeting said,

"There will be lots of quail and China pheasants in the Mosier district next year provided we do not have a hard winter. That is why we want farmers, especially, to take hold in this movement. These birds do just as well here as in the Willamette valley, and in fact it is a better district for them. If we protect them out of season we will be successful in getting the season opened up on them next year, when there will be plenty of good hunting."

The following directors were elected: J. E. Cole, L. Evans, Chas. Bennett, Geo. Chamberlain and J. E. Burpee. The following committee was selected to draft by-laws: J. R. Wilcox, Fred Evans, M. J. Olliphant, W. A. Husbands and Ernest Evans.

The next meeting will be held on Sunday afternoon, September 19, at 2 o'clock in the library building.

Association Will Ship Car of Pears

(From the Mosier Bulletin)

The first carload of pears ever shipped out of Mosier will be loaded either Monday or Tuesday of next week. This comes in response to an order from New York city and has been sold at a very satisfactory price.

The pears to be shipped will be of the d'Anjou and Comice varieties.

The pear orchards in the Mosier district are just coming into bearing, stated Manager Chatfield yesterday, and he estimates that there will be 1000 boxes more than last year. It is estimated that there will be 600 boxes of the d'Anjou and Comice varieties, 500 Bose and 400 Bartlett's. It was necessary last year in making a pear shipment of 250 Bartlett's and 250 d'Anjous to fill the remainder of the car with apples. The Bartlett pears are being sent to the cannery this year.

A communication has been received from A. P. Hatham requesting Mosier to send down exhibits to the Land Products and Manufacturers' show to be held in Portland, Hood River and The Dalles are planning on sending down exhibits, and it is probable that Mosier will come in with some good exhibits, as this district stands a good chance of capturing many prizes on the choice fruits.

Prunes are being sent to the dryer at the rate of 25 tons daily. The heavy shipments started Monday and will continue for another week. The Dalles City and Tahoma steamers are carrying the fruit to the Vancouver dryer. Local shipments of Italian prunes, d'Anjou, Fall Butter and Idaho pears and Gravenstein apples are being sent out daily in quantities from 50 to 75 boxes.
