The weather conditions of the past week have been such that no grower can afford to "take a chance" that he will not have an infestation of Apple Powdery Mildew or Apple Scab. The safest and most efficacious material to use, under certain conditions, for the control of Apple Powdery Mildew or Apple Scab is "Orchard Brand" Atomic Sulphur, which should be in combination with arsenate of lead at the time of the codling moth treatments as follows:—

- Calyx Spray for scab, mildew and codling moth control

Ten day Spray: weather conditions will govern, to some extent, the materials to be used about ten days after the petals fall as an additional control for Scab. If cool rainy weather prevails at this time use lime-sulphur at 1-50, or 4 gallons to each 200 gallon tank of spray. If the weather is reasonably clear and warm use Atomic Sulphur 24 pounds to each 200 gallon tank of spray, as this material is less likely to cause injury to the foliage and fruit than lime-sulphur solution under these conditions.

Second Codling Moth Spray: This is the fifth spray for Scab, the second for Codling Moth, and, under normal conditions, the final spray for Mildew control. Use:—

**APPLE NOTES**

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange, according to Manager Gwin, plans a national advertising campaign on next season's crop of Skookum apples, somewhat on the basis of the California Fruit Growers' Exchange though not so extensive. The plan contemplates the expenditure of about \$60,000 which will be raised by imposing a tax of 10 cents on each box of Skookum apples.

Three years ago when the advertising scheme was first tried only \$3,500 was raised. The second and third years there was considerably more. Mr. Gwin is of the opinion that every box of fancy apples handled by the Northwestern Fruit Exchange this year is packed under the Skookum brand. This would mean 1,200 to 2,000 cartons, which would give an ample advertising fund. Mr. Gwin plans to use advertising space in newspapers and magazines and in addition will have 120 salesmen for the Northwestern Fruit Exchange to educate wholesalers and retailers in behalf of northern apples.

The Dri-Fresh Co., one of the newest industries of The Dalles, will figure prominently in the apple deal this season. From an initial expenditure of \$10,000 the total investment in machinery and equipment of the concern has grown to \$55,000. It is planned to handle 5,000 tons of fruits and vegetables this season.

Mrs. Mary E. Wittenberg, widow of the late Herman Wittenberg, a prominent Pacific coast banker, and her sons, Mason and Ralph Wittenberg, have purchased the business from the original owners, W. G. McPherson and sons and R. W. King.

Representatives of the Dri-Fresh concern have already got in touch with the local apple growers, and it is likely that a large percentage of the call product will be handled.

The Office of Markets and Rural Organization has issued a report dated May 8 of apple holdings on the first of this month in 441 storages of the country. The report is as follows:

"Inasmuch as a few cold storage firms have not responded to our preliminary inquiries, this report is not quantitatively complete. The information received indicates that there were 92 per cent more apples in cold storage on May 1 this year than were held on May 1, 1915. The bearing apple orchards show an excess of 127.7 per cent and the boxed holdings an excess of 31.1 per cent over those of a year ago.

"During April 16.7 per cent of the December holdings moved from storage as compared with 29 per cent during March, 20.1 per cent during February, 14.7 per cent during January and 12 per cent during December. On May 1, 1915, 16.5 per cent of the December 1 holdings remained in the coolers.

**WHITE SALMON.**

Strawberries are ripe! Although it snowed on the hills about town Monday of last week, the weather was beautiful on the Columbia flat while the first ripe berry made its appearance.

Mrs. A. J. Henderson, of Bingen, called up the Enterprise office Monday and reported that they had found the first ripe strawberry of the season that day in their big patch.

Weather of all seasons has prevailed throughout the White Salmon valley the past week. Snow fell on Burdoin Mountain and in the Mountain Brook district last Saturday evening. In the Glenwood country there was about two inches of snow, according to reports that reached here the first of the week.

In the district around town the moisture was in the form of a cold rain and the strawberries will be held back about another week unless the weather turns warm very suddenly.
