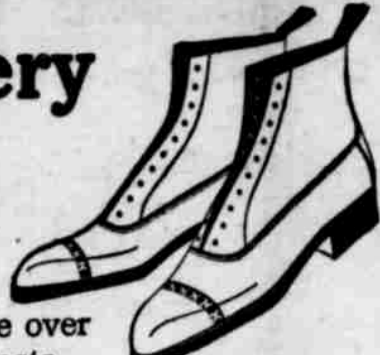


BRIEF LOCAL MENTION
