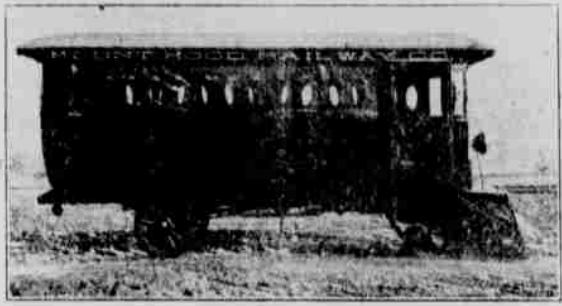

The civic committee of the Commercial club is still endeavoring to secure the cooperation of city and county officials in the purchase and equipment of an automobile park.

"The Columbia Highway will soon be open to traffic," says J. R. Norton, chairman of the civic committee, "and we will not be prepared to accommodate the many motorists who camp out on their excursions.

J. C. Porter declares that the park is a necessity, as does H. F. Davidson, just back from New York. Mr. Davidson says he believes the Highway is going to prove as big an asset to the Hood River valley as the apple industry.

United Stockholders Get Dividends

As a result of the purchase by the Apple Growers Association of the storage plants of the old Hood River Apple Growers Union, the Union stock, formerly selling for less than 50 cents on the dollar, is worth par and four years' accrued interest of 7 per cent. Through the Association's purchase of the Union property owners of the old Union stock were guaranteed all back interest. The principal is being paid off in amortizations. Holders of stock of the pioneer stock agency have received checks on a basis of 63 cents interest per share of stock, and \$2.37 per \$10 share on the principal.

Lumber Workers Loyal

The mill and camp workers of the Oregon Lumber Co. at Dee and in forests of the southwestern part of the county are extremely loyal. No I. W. W. agitator is allowed to remain a minute in the mill or camps. The big concern has experienced no labor shortage, and the plant is being operated to capacity.

Through the response of workers the Dee district, in the last Liberty loan campaign, was the first of the county to fill its quota of \$7,000. The over-subscriptions to the loan will run more than 150 per cent.

Carson Gets \$600 Reward

Marshal Carson last Thursday received from Salem a check for \$600 as a reward for the arrest of Elmer Misner 16 year old Seattle youth, and Phillip Solem, aged 23, who were convicted of robbing a passenger train on the O. W. R. & N. track near Lindsay Creek the latter part of February. The boys, whose act came near wrecking the fast eastbound limited, are both serving sentences, the younger in the state industrial school and Solem in the penitentiary.
