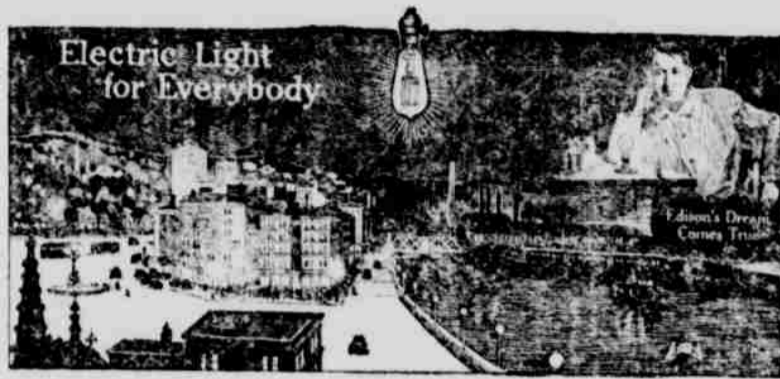

OBITUARY

Local friends have received news of the death of Ira W. White, former local resident, at Vancouver, from pneumonia, following influenza. Mr. White, aged 39, was born in Fox Valley. In 1902 he was married to Miss Vesta Parker, who, with two small sons, survives him. Mr. White was a member of the United Brethren church, and a man of noble character, he left many friends.

Mrs. J. W. Rigby has received a telegram announcing the death Sunday of her son, Rev. Samuel W. Kemmerer, at Camp Travis, San Antonio, Tex., where he was stationed as secretary at

a Y. M. C. A. hot. Rev. Kemmerer's death was caused by pneumonia, superinduced by influenza. The body will be shipped to Minneapolis, where interment will take place at Lakeside cemetery.

The funeral services of Mrs. Virgil Bower, who succumbed to pneumonia following influenza, were held at the Anderson chapel last Friday, Rev. Lewellen officiating. Interment followed at Lakeside cemetery. Mrs. Bower is survived by her husband and three children. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. R. Rader, of Willoughby, O., arrived here for the funeral.

Jacob Merle, aged 47 years, one of the state's best known mechanics, died suddenly Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Mr. Merle, while at work at the First street garage operated by him and Ed Frost, was stricken at 11 o'clock. A physician had attended him and his friend, Frank Stanton, was with him. It was thought he was on the way to recovery. Following a slight exertion he passed away before Mr. Stanton could summon aid.

Mr. Merle's body has been shipped by S. E. Hartness to Syracuse, N. Y., for interment. Mr. Merle's family resided there.

Influenza claimed two children of Mr. and Mrs. L. H. White Saturday evening. Little Irma Rebecca Barnett, aged seven years, died early in the evening. Clarence Barnett, aged 14 years, died three hours later. Their mother is ill.

Both the children were known throughout the neighborhood for their courtesy and cheery smiles. The community has not witnessed sadder deaths than theirs.

Funeral services were conducted at the grave at Lakeside cemetery Tuesday afternoon, an elder of the Church of Christ, Latter Day Saints, officiating.

Funeral services for Mrs. Tola Eby, wife of F. G. Eby, of Sacramento, Calif., were held here Monday at the Anderson chapel, interment following at Lakeside cemetery. Rev. J. D. Lewellen officiated at the funeral services.

Mrs. Eby, who was 47 years old, was here visiting her brother, J. H. Shull. She was in ill health, and the trip north was made in hopes that she would be benefited. The following other brothers survive: Hugh and B. F. Shull, of Wasco, and E. C. Shull, of Portland.
